

AUTO OWNER IS NON-SUITED IN CIRCUIT COURT

The civil suit of Dr. O. J. Johnson against the First National Bank and the A. W. Walker Auto company, all litigants being of this city was non-suited in the circuit court Thursday afternoon, the court ruling that Dr. Johnson had no legal grounds for suit against the bank.

The suit was based upon the purchase of a Peerless automobile belonging to E. H. Lamport, and to Dr. Johnson through A. W. Walker. The price was \$2200. Dr. Johnson gave a Nash car valued at \$1200, and a promissory note for \$1000. The note was sold by Walker to the bank, and all but about \$250 on it was paid by Dr. Johnson, when Lamport filed a claim against the car for money due, and Dr. Johnson was deprived, the complaint alleged, of the use of the car. Dr. Johnson claimed that he tendered the amount due on the note, but the bank refused acceptance. The matter was then carried into court.

Dr. Johnson asked for the return of the value of the Nash car, money paid on the promissory note, and damages for \$500 for loss of patients through inability to make professional calls.

Remarkable Non-Stop Record of a Star Car Here Tomorrow

One of the most remarkable non motor and non car stop runs in automotive annals was completed Monday noon in Oakland by a stock model Star touring car which was driven from Seattle to Oakland in 35 hours and 39 minutes.

Though maintaining a speed for the 1601 miles traveled between Seattle and the Star Motor Co. of California factory of better than 28 miles an hour, often making as high as 45 miles per hour, a gasoline average of 27.44 miles per gallon was obtained. The oil consumption was one and a half pints and but one quart of water was used. In the Cow Creek and Wolf Creek canyons it was necessary to run five miles per hour.

The car was one which had already seen 7770 miles of service in private ownership use.

The sturdy little economy performer was driven alternately by L. V. Rawlings, sales manager of the Dulmage Motor Co., Star car distributor in Seattle and by W. H. Ambury of the same organization.

This car on the return trip to Seattle will arrive in Medford tomorrow at 5:30 p. m. and will be on display at the Mason Motor Co., the local dealers, until Sunday at 5 a. m. when it will leave for Seattle.

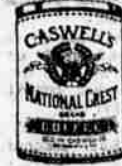
