Christmas Seals used in all lands to raise funds for greatest life saving campaign

Pioneer in Scientific Fight Against Tuberculosis in America

Christmas has acquired a new significance within the last two generations for the nations of the world. A tiny "charity stamp," emblem of a great crusade against sickness, has gradually slipped into the accepted order of holiday festivities. Last year Czechoslovakia joined the list of nations already using this little symbol of the modern spirit of good will toward men.

Charity stamps are sold today in practically every country in the world. They are used as Christmas seals at the holiday time for raising money to fight tuberculosis in the United States, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. Stamps for the aid of soldiers have been sold in Italy, Hungary and Roumania. They have been used in Austria for children's hospitals. In England, missionary organizations and churches sell stamps for special funds. In Canada, while no country-wide sale of charity stamps is held, several agencies send out tuberculosis Christmas seals that are eagerly sought by stamp collectors.

Tuberculosis is a great wrong. The greatest thing about the Christmas seal is the thought itself, with its power of setting everybody to thinking that this great wrong can be righted.

Famous Stamp Designs.
Some of the world's best known artists have designed the stamps which are now sold everywhere. So beautiful are some of the seals of the different countries, they have opened a new field for the stamp collector. Incidentally, these stamps have been responsible for the raising of over \$25,000,000 in this country alone in the last fifteen years. National, state and local tuberculosis associations have used the money to save hundreds of thousands of lives. The idea of the charity stamp first originated in this country in 1862. It came back from Denmark designed as a tuberculosis Christmas seal in the year 1907. Jacob A. Riis, the noted philanthropist, is responsible for the unique significance which now attaches itself to the little health symbol in this country. It was at his suggestion that Miss Emily P. Bissell in Wilmington, Delaware, launched the first Red Cross seal sale in this country in 1907. The idea and the tiny little stamp which was first designed at that time raised more than \$3000.

Stamps Collect Millions
Last year the National Tuberculosis Association collected nearly \$4,000,000 through the Christmas seal sale. It is hoped that this year at least \$5,000,000 will be raised. As the sale of these seals mounts year after year the toll of the White Plague in this country steadily decreases. The death rate for every 100,000 was 198 in 1908. Last year it was 97 for every 100,000. Christmas seals cannot be sold without first selling the idea of the prevention of tuberculosis.

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BOY SCOUTS NOT MILITARY SAYS LOCAL S. MASTER

In order that there may be no misunderstanding relative to the nature of the Boy Scout organization, Scout Commissioner Coan has issued the following statement setting forth the purpose of the boy movement in general.

"It seems that there has been some slight misunderstanding regarding the real nature and purpose of the scout organization and the training of the individual scouts. In order that the parents of all Medford boys may more clearly understand the three-fold purpose of the organization and the kind of training which we give the boys thru scoutcraft may I state briefly the great underlying objective. Character building, citizenship training and Americanization.

"The organization is not military, nor has it any connection or relation to any military organization. It has no military system or purpose. It is kept as far as possible from all kinds of military training and activity. No one wants it to be military. However as a means to an end, and that end the disciplinary training of the individual boy, each scout learns how to handle himself, to march and to control himself thru a simple system of formation and maneuvers. Because this has, after a fashion, a military aspect, some have become confused and concluded the boys organization has a military purpose. The one objective is the discipline of the individual boy in order that character building and citizenship training may have a foundation upon which to develop.

"The one purpose of scoutcraft is the development of all fine qualities of clean, upright boyhood and eventually, manhood. "The scout training is effected by encouraging the boy thru his own enthusiasm to develop himself as an efficient citizen, to create his own character and his individual self-discipline, from within."

"The scout oath and the scout law become the underlying principle of each boy's training. The oath is as follows: "On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the scout law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight." There are a few besides scouts who need to keep such a pledge as this. The scout law is made up of twelve words and their meaning. Every scout must practice them. They are: "A scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent."

"The materials of scouting are: Woodcraft, fieldcraft, watercraft, sky-craft, campcraft, healthcraft and with its larger life-crafts of character, of service and right living. The method is to bring the boy-nature and these wordcrafts together naturally. Scout leadership endeavors to provide conditions under which habits of character and citizenship may be consciously developed, under conditions of pleasure and interest to the boy, under conditions which provide chances for expression and doing things, under conditions of association and cooperation which make for democracy, under conditions in the great outdoors which build for health. The churches of the nation, which are ever against any system of militarism, are solidly back of the scout movement almost without exception. No system of boy training has yet presented itself which has so well proven its worth."
