

## ASHLAND LAWYER NAMED PRESIDENT BAR ASSOCIATION

ASHLAND, Dec. 10.—A very interesting meeting of the Jackson and Josephine County Bar association was held at the Masonic hall Saturday evening. About forty-five people were there, including the ladies. E. D. Briggs, president of the Bar association, presided at the meeting. Dean William G. Hale, dean of the law department of the University of Oregon, gave a fine address on "Greater Educational Requirements for Those Hereafter Admitted to the Bar" and "Raising the Educational Standard." ### M'CARTHY CASE TO COME UP TODAY AT BIG MEETING

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—The task of shaping professional baseball clubs for their 1924 season was undertaken today by more than 1200 leaders of the sport, gathered here for the biggest meeting in the game's history.

Arrangements of schedules, settlement of disputes, exchange of players and numerous minor matters confronted the major and minor league officials during their six days of meeting and bargaining.

Speculation among these officials pointed to possible deals involving Rogers Hornsby, second baseman of the St. Louis Cardinals, Eddie Collins, captain of the Chicago White Sox; Urban Shocker, pitcher, St. Louis Browns, and other stars.

There was talk that Collins might go to Washington as manager while a trade is spoken of that would bring Hornsby to the Chicago Nationals. President Veeck is understood to have offered four players for Hornsby.

Frank Chance, new manager of the Chicago Americans, intends to make two or three deals in an attempt to strengthen the club.

Today's meetings include a session of the board of arbitration of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, meeting of the National league and the board of directors of the American league, in addition to three minor league meetings.

First among the cases to be considered by the board of arbitration was the McCarthy-Williams controversy over the presidency of the Pacific coast league. W. H. McCarthy of San Francisco, deposed president and Harry A. Williams, the new incumbent, were here to explain their version of the situation. The American association convened to take up the task of arranging its 1924 schedule. President Hickey said that two schedules, one calling for 154 games and the other for 168, are to be considered. The Southern association and the Western league also met to take up their problems.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 10.—Pancho Villa, world's flyweight champion, will defend his title here tonight in a ten round decision bout with Patsy Wallace of Philadelphia.

Villa met Wallace in a no-decision bout here about a year ago and received the popular verdict by a narrow margin.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Gene Tunney, of Greenwich village and Harry Greb of Pittsburgh meet in a fifteen round decision bout tonight at Madison Square Garden for the third time with the light-heavyweight boxing championship of the United States at stake.

Carpenter Challenges Winner

PARIS, Dec. 10.—Francis Deschamps, on behalf of Georges Carpentier, has called a challenge to the winner of the Tammey-Greb fight tonight for the American light-heavyweight championship. Should the match be arranged, Carpentier would leave France immediately after New Year's day and be ready to box in February.

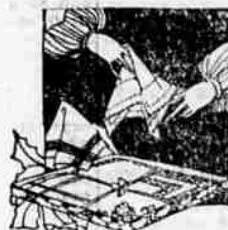

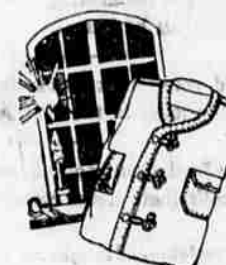
