

PRESENTATION OF KIWANIS CHARTER BRILLIANT AFFAIR

Two hundred Kiwanians and their ladies enjoyed the charter presentation and dinner dance at the Hotel Medford last night. A charter presentation represents the official christening of a Kiwanis club and the entertainment committee in charge of Deke Barr gave the members and their guests one of the most brilliant parties of the season.

The charter presentation address, the outstanding feature of the evening, was delivered by Northwest Governor of Kiwanis S. W. Lawrence, of Portland. The speaker said the rule of Kiwanis was the Golden Rule, and that the understanding of Kiwanis, which the organization endeavored to instill in all Kiwanians, planted in the minds and hearts of men a real intense and honest desire to build, and to lift up and take the selfishness out of men.

Comparing Kiwanis to the lodge and the church, both of which he said he was a member of and fully appreciated, the speaker stressed the point that Kiwanians were bound by no fixed oath or obligation to any particular membership or ritualistic exactions, but through the practical application of the Golden Rule and a desire to render constructive service, without limits, in the community, the organization built up community character and helped to restore good will and good fellowship where it was needed. True Kiwanianism not only was anxious to render a conscientious service, the speaker said, but wanted to do more than was required of it by any rules or limitations usually exacted in organizations.

The underprivileged child, the speaker said, was receiving much attention from Kiwanis clubs throughout the country. Pointing out that all children come into the world with equal rights, the desire of Kiwanians was to see that the underprivileged child had a chance to develop mentally and physically as well as to enjoy the pleasures and sunshine of childhood which the privileged child has.

Governor Lawrence then presented the charter to President William J. Warner, who responded in a few well chosen words pledging the Medford Kiwanis club to fidelity to the high ideals and practices of Kiwanianism. The address on "Kiwanis Values" was delivered by Charles F. Walker, president of the Northwestern School of Commerce, of Portland. Being in

close contact with his work, with the developing youth in a city, many interesting phases of the privileged as well as the under privileged youth were presented, the speaker bringing out very forcibly that the privileged youth of today in many ways presents a more difficult problem than the under privileged child does, who knows from experience how to appreciate the advantages he receives. The address was concluded with an amusing and novel comparison of man and an automobile. The address was much enjoyed and generously applauded.

During the evening many novel features were introduced.

A dress, donated by John C. Mann, was won by Mrs. W. W. Howard and favors were distributed to all the guests. Colored balloons attached to each chair furnished much amusement. Alford's orchestra furnished its usual highly popular music for dancing and accompanied the singers and dancers on the program. Telegrams of congratulation were read from Astoria, Albany, Reedsport, Seattle, Spokane, Marshfield, The Dalles, Chicago, Salem, Portland, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Yakima as well as from the Kiwanis International headquarters and various high officials of the organization. Delegates from Kiwanis clubs in all the nearby cities were in attendance.

The dancing of Iola Rubenstein was a feature of the evening, and a real treat and a clever impersonation of "The Little Minister" by Billie Fenton, who wittily accused the local club of locking its doors to ministers, brought out much merriment. A dance by the Billings Sisters merited the generous applause received.

Rev. William B. Hamilton was an honored guest of the evening and said grace before the banquet. C. E. Gates was toastmaster.

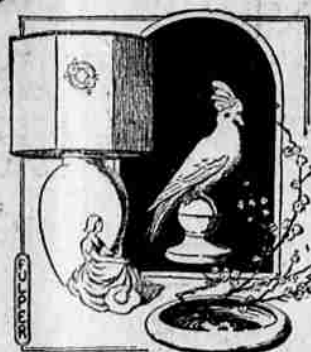

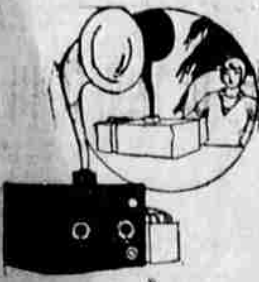

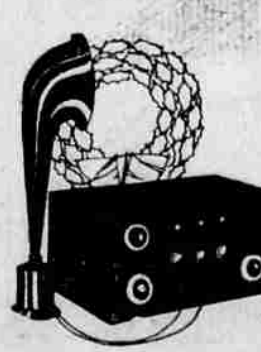
