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CRATER LAKE SUP'T URGES UNITY IN SCENIC CAMPAIGN

"The communities interested in Crater lake and the Oregon caves must get together on a common program to secure the needed appropriations for the two resorts, declared Col. C. G. Thomson, speaking today at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon, says Monday's Grants Pass Courier. "Colonel Thomson, who has charge of the Crater Lake National park, stated that the factor which killed appropriations was the lack of harmony between municipalities and urged that southern Oregon work as a unit to get the things desired for the two national resorts.

"Tourist travel is increasing every year, stated Colonel Thomson, and showed where the traffic to the Crater park was 67 per cent greater in 1923 than during the year previous. Few Oregonians have seen the lake or the caves, he said, and are unable to tell strangers anything about them, which creates a bad impression among the tourists, the forest rangers are instructed to do everything possible for the travelers. They go on the theory that the tourist is always right unless he is so wrong that he must be arrested."

A. L. Bixby of Lincoln, Nebraska, who for 31 years has conducted the "Daily Drift" column of the Nebraska State Journal, accompanied by his wife, is visiting his brother, R. A. Bixby, of Jacksonville, on a tour of the Pacific Northwest, en route to visit a son of Porterville, Calif., and friends and relatives at Long Beach and Los Angeles.

Mr. Bixby is the second oldest columnist in the land, in point of service, being exceeded only by Frank L. Stanton of the Atlanta Constitution. He is a bosom friend of Walt Mason, creator of "Rippling Rhymes" and will visit that noted humorist, while in California.

In 1907, Mr. Bixby, wrote and published a poem in his column, that so impressed a millionaire reader, that he financed a two months trip, with all expenses paid to Europe. 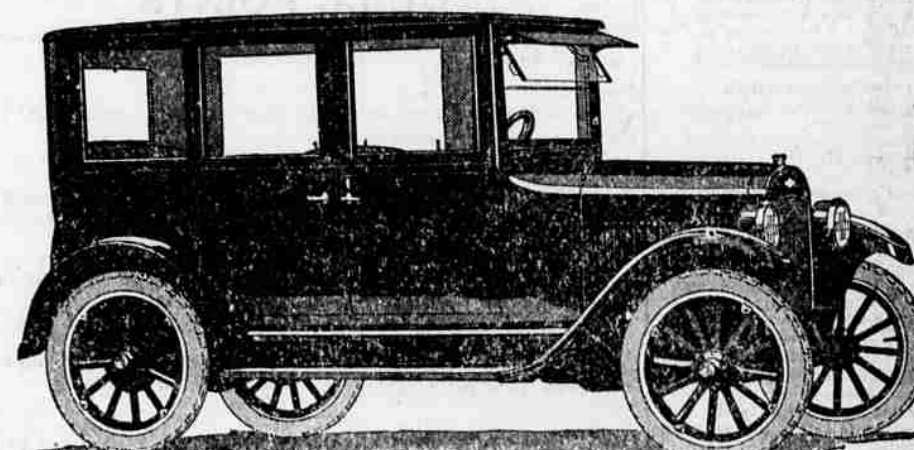
