GIRL NEAR DEATH, MUST RETURN WITH LOVER FOR TRIAL

NAPA, Cal., Dec. 11.—Edward J. Salsburg and Dorothy Anderson, nomadic lovers, whose three years of roving terminated in their arrest here, completed preparations today for their return, with officers to Douglas county, Wisconsin, where in 1920 they robbed a grave of the body of a friend and burned the corpse so that the charred bones would be mistaken for those of Salsburg.

The pair were allowed plenty of time to arrange their affairs today. The journey back to Wisconsin may not begin until tonight or tomorrow, according to Sheriff W. A. Hagreen and District Attorney Robert Kennedy of Douglas county, who with Mrs. Hagreen are here in charge of the fugitives.

Miss Anderson, formerly in Chicago cabarets, where she was known as the "sunshine girl" because of her cheerful temperament, will rise from a hospital cot to go back to Wisconsin with Salsburg to face charges of arson for the burning of a cottage at Lake Nebagamon, Wisconsin. It was in the ruins of this house that bones were found which were those of Allan McPhee, whose body was dug up by Salsburg for the hoax intended to cover the latter's trail.

Miss Anderson is now emaciated from the ravages of tuberculosis.

COOLIDGE CLUB IS FORMED IN BIRTH PLACE OF JOHNSON

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 11.—The move on the part of friends of President Calvin Coolidge to invade California found expression of action in Senator Hiram Johnson's home city last night when Secretary of State Frank C. Jordan and State Treasurer Charles G. Johnson took the lead in forming the Republican League of Sacramento county. Republicans in attendance at the organization meeting of the league which started with a membership of 168 voters were emphatic in their declarations that California will send a delegation to the national convention pledged to Coolidge.

The league to back Coolidge in the city of Johnson's birth followed the organization a week ago of a Johnson-for-president club. This club was sponsored by the Sacramento county central committee which is controlled by Johnson men.

State Treasurer Johnson told the league that 82 similar organizations had been formed in California and added that many others will be listed after the state meeting of Coolidge followers to be held in San Francisco tomorrow.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Senator Hiram Johnson will campaign personally in Massachusetts, President Coolidge's home state, it was announced last night.

32ND PART OF INCH MAY BLOCK MOVE TO STANDARDIZE LUMBER

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 11.—Disagreement over a thirty-second part of an inch in the thickness of an ordinary board is the obstacle that may block a nation-wide movement to bring lumber standardization with a resultant saving of nearly \$250,000,000 annually to the American home building public, according to C. P. Winslow, director of the United States forest products laboratory here.

The question "how thick is an inch board?" will be discussed at a meeting of lumber producers, retail dealers and consumers tomorrow in Washington for the purpose of arriving at permanent American lumber standards, Mr. Winslow said. If an agreement as to thickness is reached, he declared, then standardization becomes an actuality; if not, the movement, in his opinion, may die.

Director Winslow said that the need for standardization of lumber grades is shown by the fact that the same kind of pine is now sold at various prices under thirty different grades.

OVER \$50,000,000 XMAS DIVIDENDS DECLARED IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—(City Associated Press). Holiday disbursements to stockholders in American industrial and railroad corporations in the form of extra, increased or resumed dividends, exclusive of the regular quarterly payments declared during December, will total well in excess of \$50,000,000, according to reliable estimates in the financial district. Total dividend disbursements by such corporations, which include practically all of those having wide stock distribution in December is expected to exceed \$150,000,000, while the year's dividends probably will aggregate more than \$1,000,000,000 as compared with about \$876,000,000 in 1922.

Interest payments to bond holders, including disbursements of this character on government obligations, average approximately \$200,000,000 a month, or \$2,400,000,000 for the year.

Accurate statistics for the first eleven months of 1923 disclose dividend payments by industrial corporations of \$688,710,500 and by railroads of \$345,080,000 as compared with \$474,820 and \$336,598,400 respectively, for the corresponding period last year.

More than 50 corporations voted extra or increased dividends or authorized the resumption of payments to stockholders after a lapse in such payments during the month of December. The number of such payments far exceeded those of the 1922 holiday season.

Regular dividends in December by industrial corporations, it is estimated will total about \$60,000,000, a figure somewhat greater than December, 1922 payments, while railroad dividends will approximate \$40,000,000, also a larger sum than the carriers paid a year ago.

Extra or increased payments have been confined to no one branch of industry.

One of the largest extra payments was that authorized by directors of the Ingersoll Rand company who voted an extra cash dividend of \$20, and a stock dividend of ten per cent in addition to the regular payments due at this time.

The extra cash dividends amounted to about \$20,000,000.

The Eastman Kodak company voted an extra dividend of \$1.25 on its 2,500,000 shares of no par value stock outstanding, amounting to about \$3,000,000.
