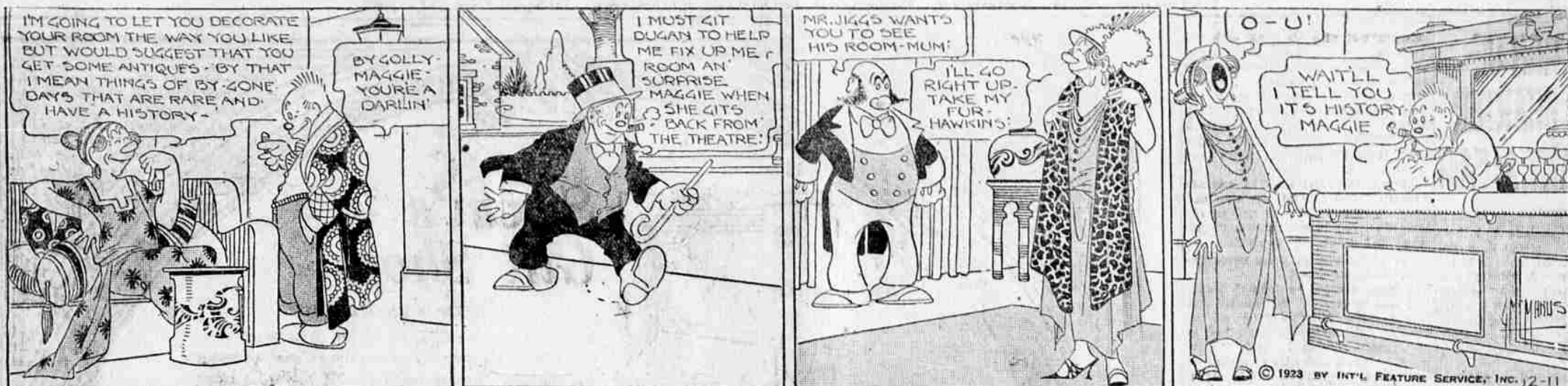

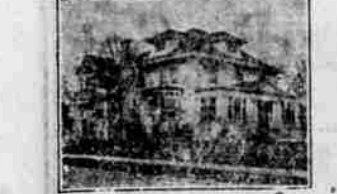

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—After one hectic day of fleeting rumors and few accomplishments, professional baseball league officials today settled down to the second of the week's sessions with a more definite program of work before them.

MORE SHOW FOR LESS MONEY, MARCUS

The declaration of A. B. Marcus, whose Marcus Show will be the attraction at the Page theatre Saturday matinee and night, Dec. 15, says the salvation of the legitimate theatre is "more show for less money," and has created no end of comment by newspapers, theatregoers and showmen.

Many managers declare that not one single item of expense connected with their productions has gone down since the top peak, none have raised prices twenty percent in the last few weeks, while Ziegfeld's "Follies" has announced a dramatic cut in the price scale.

Mr. Marcus says: "The show this season is going to bring a loss or at best might lean profits to any theatrical producer engaged. We are confronted with costs that have not depreciated in the last twelve months; the public has become more critical and money is scarce. The 'Marcus Show's' advent has come to be an annual event. To close up for a season would be poor business. Taking all angles into consideration, I have decided that since we find it best to operate our current insurance against loss is giving the public 'more show for less money.' That is why I have instructed my representatives to make price scales those in vogue before the war. I figure this policy will pack the various houses we play to the limit of their seating capacity."
