

RUINS OF OLD SLAV SANCTUARY FOUND, GERMANY

FELDBERG, Mecklenburg.—Ruins of an ancient Slav sanctuary have been unearthed near this town by Dr. Carl Schuchhard, director of the Berlin Museum of Anthropology, which he believes to have been Rethra, the temple of the Slavs between the rivers Elbe and Oder. Schuchhard was the name of the god who was worshipped here, and the temple was relatively more important than the Delphi of the Greeks.

Rethra stood for several centuries and was destroyed in 1068 and 1069 under the reign of Henry IV. The bishop of Halberstadt, under orders from the emperor, destroyed the sanctuary. Schuchhard was the name of his bishop, and it is still preserved in the folklore of northern Germany. He is supposed to have become immensely rich through plundering the temple and there is a nursery rhyme which makes an appeal to this ancient bishop to make gifts to children.

Dr. Schuchhard says the descriptions of the temple written by the bishop of Merseburg, who lived about the year 1000, tally with his discoveries and he is confident he has located the lost shrine for which archaeologists have been seeking for generations.

In the Spreewald, near Berlin, the population still retains the customs, dress and language of the ancient

LANDIS WINS IN BASEBALL FIGHT

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—(By Associated Press). The major leagues' joint session recessed late today after adopting the majority of 17 amendments proposed by Commissioner K. M. Landis, with slight changes in all those adopted. This action, the principal one before the session, was taken without any sign of friction, the magnates asserted.

One of the principal amendments of those adopted related to extension of Landis' control over umpires' decisions or disputes arising from them. The commissioner announced at the start of the meeting that the amendments were proposed to him by various club owners and were not his own.

Manila Not Taking Chances
MANILA.—The authorities have redoubled their watchfulness at public meetings, and especially at sporting events, as a precaution against disorders. This step is taken because of the feeling engendered by the recent campaign and election.

Marriage Depends On Earnings.
COPENHAGEN.—Many of the larger banks in Denmark are considering the making of a rule that no bank employee may marry unless his wage amounts to at least 4000 crowns plus the bonus necessitated by the rise in prices since the war, says the Politiken. In one bank, this wage is not obtained until after 14 years' service so that it would appear some Danish clerks will be condemned to years of celibacy if the suggestion is carried through.

FEAR PARTY OF 11 LOST IN PACIFIC

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Dec. 12.—Seaplanes this afternoon joined in the search for eight chief petty officers of the navy, two civilians and a ten year old boy who are believed to have been lost or driven ashore on San Clemente island.

The party left here last Friday for a hunting trip on the island and was due back Sunday. Naval officers did not become alarmed until today when the commanding officer of the U. S. S. Procyon asked for assistance from the commander in chief. The tug Kingfisher was immediately ordered out. Shortly after noon a naval seaplane and a plane chartered by friends of the missing men hopped off to join in the search.

GRAIN COMMITTEE IN HOUSE NAMED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—House members from the grain growing states of the northwest named a committee today to confer with Secretary Wallace in regard to changes in the grading of grain. A delegation of grain men which placed a request for changes before President Coolidge yesterday appeared before the members today.

The committee, appointed by Representative Nelson, republican, Wisconsin, chairman of the meeting, was instructed to draw up legislation seeking the changes if action is not taken by the president or Mr. Wallace.
