

PIONEER WOMAN OF ROGUE VALLEY DIES, AGED 80 YRS.

Zerilda Turpin, 80 years old, a resident of Rogue River valley for the past 54 years, and widow of the late Hamilton C. Turpin, who passed away in 1913, died at her home 7 miles north of Medford at 7 o'clock this morning after an illness of one week.

Mrs. Turpin was born in Scotland county, Mo., March 24, 1843, and was married in the same county March 28, 1867 to Hamilton Turpin. The family moved from Missouri to California where they resided for one year, coming to southern Oregon in 1869. She resided on the home place since 1901. She leaves to mourn her demise, 8 children, they are: James Turpin of Portland, Charles, of Central Point, Mrs. B. E. Gilbert, Medford; Mrs. Lane Wyland, Beagle; Thomas Turpin, Bremerton, Wash.; Niron and Archie Turpin of Medford.

Also two sisters, Mrs. William Gregory and Susan Penland of Central Point. Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel Saturday at 1 p. m. Rev. D. J. Howe officiating. Interment in Central Point cemetery.
