

CHICAGO STARTS A DRIVE TO GET DEMOCRATIC CON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Word of a civic non-partisan movement in Chicago to secure the 1924 democratic national convention was received today at national democratic headquarters.

George Brennan, democratic national committee man for Illinois, telegraphed that he had conferred with civic leaders of Chicago who might co-operate with Fred W. Upham, national republican treasurer, to get the democratic national convention for Chicago.

Mr. Upham has been in charge of similar efforts in the past to secure the republican convention.

The democratic convention city will be selected here January 15 at a meeting of the national committee. With Chicago an active bidder, the competition was widened to include New York and St. Louis and possibly San Francisco, Kansas City, Nashville and Atlanta.

Some democratic leaders here expect the competition to narrow finally to Chicago, St. Louis and New York.

NEW FILTERING PROCESS REMOVES COLOR FROM WINE

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Spectacular results in filtration have been obtained by a new invention of Doctor H. S. Hele-Shaw, who recently explained his method to members of the Royal society.

The doctor has a stream-line filter along which liquids can be passed under pressure through many thousands of tightly packed, perforated sheets of paper. He claims he has taken the color out of red wine and tea, and has extracted the color from milk and left a tasteless, fluid-like water.

ASKS PUBLICITY ON DRY MIX-UP

SEATTLE, Dec. 13.—Guy E. Kelly of Tacoma, republican national committeeman for Washington, has telegraphed D. H. Blair, commissioner of internal revenue, it was announced here today, demanding publication of a report for the state and William B. Whitney, Gordon O'Hara, H. V. Mooring and J. H. Simmons of his staff were criticized.

"I told Blair," said Mr. Kelly, "that I thought it a very great mistake to sit on this report any longer; that people here were becoming restless and skeptical of the good faith of our administration officials and that the best thing to be done was to let it have the light of day, and then let it stand or fall on the facts it disclosed or pretended to disclose."

A LOW LYNCHING RECORD IN 1923

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—The last twelve months have made a golden year in the lynching record of the country, it was declared in a statement to the executive committee of the federal council of churches today by its commission on race relations.

In the first six months of 1923 there were only 14 lynchings in the United States, 13 being negro victims, the statement said. In the first six months of 1922 there were 30 lynchings and in the first six months of 1921 there were 33.

May Stop Indian Dances; Braves Give Away Their Squaws

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Tribal dances and ceremonies came in for considerable discussion today before Secretary Works' advisory committee on Indian affairs. A majority of the speakers urged that the committee go on record as upholding the stand of the Indian bureau in discouraging only those dances among Indians that are found to be detrimental to morals.

In the records of the bureau there are affidavits said Mr. Lindquist, concerning "secret" dances that "should certainly go." He referred to the "give away" dance practiced among certain tribes as a certain ceremony at which Indians "are likely to get excited and give away all they possess," including at times a wife or daughter.

HEALTH SERVICE TO MAKE A STUDY OF COMMON COLDS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—A detailed study of common colds is to be made by the Public Health Service in co-operation with a number of the country's leading universities. Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, surgeon general, says colds, influenza and similar conditions are responsible for a great deal of suffering, loss of time, disability and a not inconsiderable number of deaths.

He says there are few, if any, individuals who do not suffer from some acute respiratory condition at least once a year losing from a day to a week or more as a result, and some attacks develop into more serious conditions, at times even a latent pulmonary tuberculosis being lighted up. Comparatively little is definitely known as to the real causes, distribution, manner of spread, and epidemiology of these so-called minor respiratory ailments, Dr. Cumming says, and this detailed study being undertaken is expected to be of value in attempting to prevent these afflictions.

The work will be actively undertaken at Harvard university, Johns Hopkins Medical school, Georgetown and Howard universities, Washington, Tulane university, New Orleans; Ohio State university, University of Chicago and University of California. It is anticipated the studies will extend over two or three years.

FIGHTING BOB EVANS' FLAGSHIP IS JUNKED

SEATTLE, Dec. 13.—A floating mass of impotent metal that once flew the flag of Admiral "Fighting Bob" Evans from her masthead as she headed the squadron of American battleships on a tour of the world fifteen years ago, the U. S. S. Connecticut was moored to a local wharf last night. Her engines long since dismantled, her mighty guns that belched defiance on the seven seas and brought her the coveted honor of being first in gunnery of the Atlantic fleet, now useless in compliance with the mandate of the Washington arms conference, the U. S. S. Connecticut was towed here from Bremerton. She will be refitted to permit her movement to San Francisco where she will be scrapped. The Union Construction company bought the vessel for junk.

BUGLE PLAYERS THRILL GERMAN CHURCH-GOERS

BERLIN.—Buglers who give Sunday concerts on church-spires attract large crowds in Germany, and in fact the practice is extending throughout Central Europe.

Trinity church, which stands near the American embassy in Berlin, frequently has such concerts on religious holidays. A quartet of buglers play religious tunes on a balcony about the spire of the church at least 100 feet above the surrounding streets.

MEXICAN BATTLE EXPECTED

(By the Associated Press)—General Andrew Almazan with the Obregon forces last night evacuated the city of Puebla and Governor Manjerres, a De La Huerta partisan, who had been removed as governor by President Obregon, again took over the office, according to a report received here today by the Light. The report added that the De La Huerta forces under General Guadalupe Sanchez are expected momentarily to enter Puebla.

This is taken to indicate, the Light said, that Obregon will not defend Mexico City and that the decisive battle for control will be fought somewhere around Celaya or Queretaro.

President Obregon has left Mexico City, accompanied by Minister of War Mazon, to take personal command of the Amaro forces concentrating in Guanajuato and Queretaro.

General Francisco Manzo and Arnulfo are still in Mexico City with troops and are expected to leave shortly for the front.

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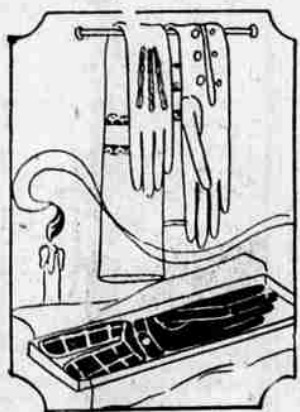
