EXPECT VERDICT IN HOMER PELLET CASE LATE TODAY

The case of the state of Oregon against Homer Pellet, charged with driving an auto while intoxicated will be finished in circuit court this afternoon and will be the last case to be heard at the present term, until next February.

Pellet is alleged to have run into Russell Wells, injuring him, and Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Darling of Ashland, passengers on an interurban bus, and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Stanchiff of Phoenix, at whose home Russell Wells was visiting at the time of the accident, testified that they smelled liquor on his breath, after the accident. Wells, who took the witness stand, with the aid of crutches, said he smelled liquor but did not know on whose breath.

Stanchiff testified he knew Pellet for 15 or 20 years, and that he also judged he had been drinking. "Because his tongue was thick," and asked that a doctor be called. "Three or four times after a doctor had been called."

The accident happened July 16th last, about 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The defense is represented by Attorney Roberts, and the state by District Attorney Newton Borden and Deputy District Attorney Gaylord.

The case is expected to be given to the jury this afternoon.

PROFESSOR VINING NEAR DEATH IN AUTO ACCIDENT

ASHLAND, Dec. 14.—Professor L. E. Vining, president of the State Chamber of Commerce, narrowly escaped death Tuesday when the car in which he was riding went down a bank and turned over, pinning himself and the men accompanying him. Mr. Ness and Mr. Swigert, under the car. Mr. Vining had just addressed the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce that evening. Mr. Ness and Mr. Swigert had driven down from Roseburg to accompany him to that place. Mr. Vining was driving. The accident occurred just after the party had crossed the bridge over the South Umpqua. They were driving about twenty-five miles an hour when suddenly a truck belonging to the state highway department appeared in their path, striking acrossways of the highway. As the foggy the driver did not notice the truck until he was within several feet of it and in order to keep from running head-on into the truck, turned the car and ran down the bank. When they had gone down the bank a few feet the car turned over, pinning the men under it. They lay there for about ten minutes before any assistance came to them. Neither Ness nor Swigert were hurt, but Mr. Vining received several bruises and nearly fractured several ribs. However, a car came along and offered to take them on to Roseburg, where Mr. Vining delivered the scheduled speech after consulting a doctor to see that his wounds were not serious. In looking around after the accident Mr. Vining stated that a flag was found about thirty feet from the truck. It is thought that a red flag is supposed to be posted one hundred feet from any danger point. The truck had been dumping gravel and to do so it was necessary to place it directly across the road.
