NEW RADIOPHONE AT CENTRAL POINT GETS L. ANGELES

CENTRAL POINT, Dec. 14.—It is seldom that a radiophone can be operated under the conditions of the one owned by Mr. A. R. Parker. It is a common thing for Mr. Parker to disconnect both his aerial wire and ground wire from his set, and then receive music from stations hundreds of miles distant. Of course, the music or whatever else is being broadcasted is not loud enough to be intelligible on the loud speaker, so the phones are used in lieu of that. Mr. Parker recently purchased the set, consisting of four vacuum tubes, one detector, and the other three for various stages of amplification. He is to be congratulated upon the possession of such a superior set. Above all, it is not a factory made set, but hand made by Mr. Painter, formerly a local resident, but now of California. Among the stations heard in this manner were KGW of Portland and KJLJ of Los Angeles, KGW is owned and operated by the Morning Oregonian in Portland, Oregon, while KJLJ is operated by the Los Angeles Times.
