Evanson, and pupil of the music dept. of St. Mary's Academy, in a recital last evening gave a most remarkable exhibition of a most charming, of clean-cut rhythm and brilliant technique that was a marvelous finish of style and beauty. Her were conspicuous qualities of this charming little "prodigy of the piano." She seemed to get deeply into the spirit of her music, and interpreted it with surprising intelligence.

Every number of her varied program was played exceedingly well, and held the large audience spellbound. The "Chaminade" selection was given with loud emphasis and rich color scheme. The foundation of the child's piano seems solid, and it goes without saying that little Miss Evanson possesses talent far above the ordinary and her future promises to be a child reach such heights of interpretive genius as was demonstrated on last evening's program.

Misses Marion Ness and Mary McKendree interested the audience with two splendid readings. The Academy "Tribute Triad" sang delightfully, and Miss Patricia Miksche gave some harp selections in her usual charming manner. The program closed with a brilliant piece by the Academy orchestra.

D. O. K. K. PROGRAM FOR NEXT CONCERT INTERESTING ONE

Four numbers from the Suite Atlantis by V. P. Safarik will be one of the features of the D. O. K. K. band's program in their concert at the new armory Thursday, Dec. 20th. Atlantis is a continent mentioned in Plato's History and extended across the Atlantic ocean approximately from Europe to Yucatan. It is the subject of an exhaustive volume by Ignatius Donnelly and has also served as inspiration for several novelists.

This continent it is believed was the home of a great race which the quered and civilized the world. The legends are considered to be the tops of its lofty mountains, and are all that now remains above water of the great country.

The Suite opens with a nocturne and Morning Hymn of Praise. Here the composer has written so ably that one can almost see the sun rise.

Number two is a court function portrayed by a very light gavotte, the entrance of the celebrities being heralded by an intricate figure for brass. The theme again merges into a light gavotte and finishes with a pianissimo figure for wood wind.

The third is a love song beginning with a solo from Euphonium, which instrument establishes the theme. It is then taken up by the cornet and embellished by an obligato for the euphonium.

The last number is the Destruction hence very descriptive. The motif, however, of the love song can be distinguished through the number, which finishes with every instrument of the entire band at its utmost volume.

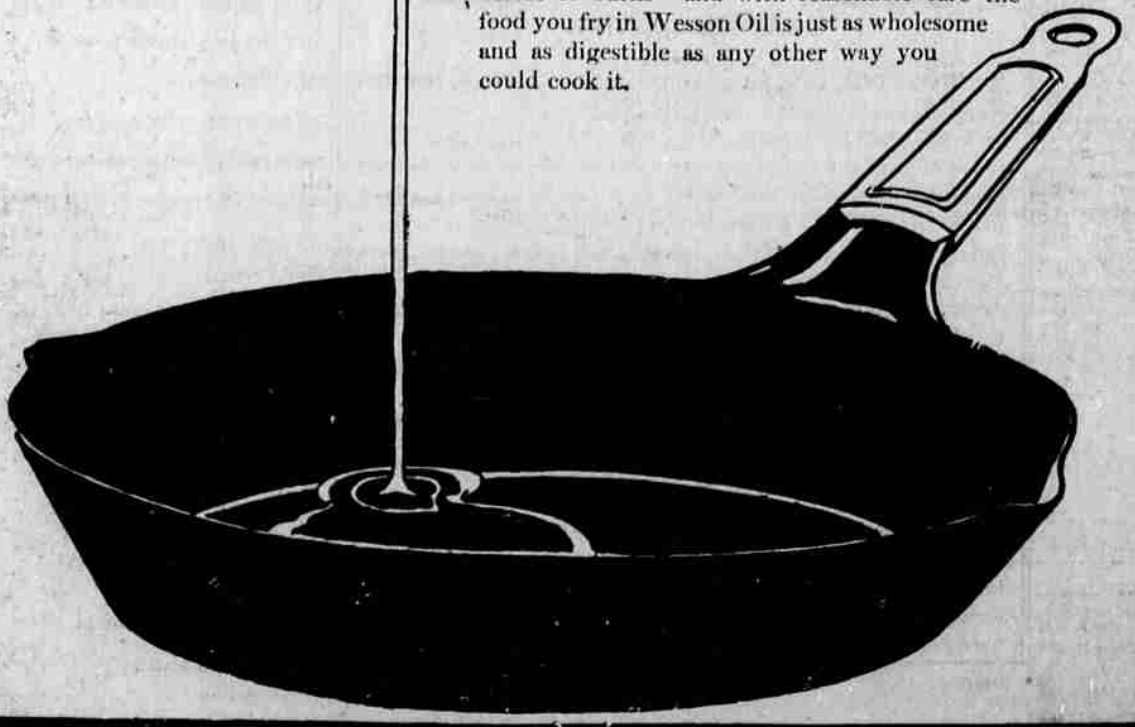
