

10 LOST IN WRECK OFF OREGON COAST

10 MEN ARE LOST IN SEA AT COOS BAY

Steamer Schooner C. A. Smith Piled On Rocks Near Marshfield—14 of Crew Rescued, While Ten Are Drowned—Heroism Is Blamed for Loss of Lives.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 17.—Ten men were lost yesterday as a result of the wreck of the steamship C. A. Smith, which went on the rocks inside the north jetty of Coos Bay when she became disabled by being hit by breakers while attempting to leave the harbor.

The missing: H. Borahl, third mate; A. Leland, wireless operator; T. Chalmers, chief engineer; A. Rajahn, seaman; C. Sampson, seaman; H. Anderson, oiler; A. Granfelt, oiler.

In addition to these members of the vessel's crew, who were drowned when a lifeboat was swamped yesterday, C. N. Prescott, deck hand of the tug Oregon was washed away yesterday while engaged in rescue work.

Seven men who remained with the wreck overnight were landed this morning when they launched a lifeboat and were taken aboard the tug Oregon. They were Captain T. Blomberg, First Mate M. A. Sundell; Second Mate C. Ecklund; Third Assistant Engineer H. Flemming and Seamen H. H. Jerline, O. Nikolason and E. Huhtala.

Seven men who were rescued by the coast guard yesterday are: Fred Baubel, seaman; H. Frjidge and E. Calvey, firemen; W. A. Shields, cook; John Bertha, cabin boy; K. Kircholl, mess boy and Albert Klaus, galley man.

Died to Save Cripple
Heroism on the part of members of the crew of the C. A. Smith in their efforts to save A. Leland, crippled wireless operator, caused the loss of at least some of the men, according to survivors, who have been brought to Marshfield Sunday when the coastguard lifeboat was at the wreck.

It was not thoroughly understood why all the crew did not take advantage of the opportunity and leave at once.

Today it developed that the men did not want to go until the wireless boy had been saved. Leland was only twenty years old and is the son of a college professor at Berkeley. He wore artificial feet and was not able to take care of himself.

The survivors said today that they all wanted to see the boy taken off first. They intended to get a line around him and lower him to the coast guard lifeboat. Some realized that this would take some minutes and went back to their cabins to get some of their necessities. The efforts to save Leland caused the delay which prevented all of the men leaving with the coast guard.

When Captain Blomberg was taken aboard the tug Oregon this morning with other survivors who had passed the night on the wreck he fell into the arms of William Denman, chairman of the board of directors of the Coos Bay Lumber company who was on the tug.

The captain wept, expressing grief for the loss of nine of his men.

The lifeboat was lowered from the wreck this morning at a fortunate time for the heavy seas had subsided for a time and after the boat was launched the survivors were taken aboard the tug, the seas again became rough.

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Make People Vote By Taxing Those Who Fail to Do So

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—A plan to tax voters who fail to cast ballots was presented by Judge F. M. McKinley at a joint meeting of University of Michigan and University of Iowa alumni at the Hamilton club today. Judge McKinley advocated passage of a bill "to be presented to our next legislature in the nature of a voter's tax, based on the same principle as the poll tax with a provision that there shall be levied, say 15 to 25 dollars or 50 dollars against every voter, man or woman, with specific and stringent provisions for collection."

N. YORK RECTOR DOFFS SURPLICE DEFIES CHURCH

Dr. Leighton Parks of St. Bartholomew's Challenges Doctrine of Virgin Birth and Welcomes Trial On Charge of Heresy.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—An issue has been raised between the modernist and fundamentalist factions of the Protestant Episcopal church which some churchmen fear will develop into one of the greatest theological controversies of recent years.

The storm center is the Rev. Lee W. Heaton, rector of Trinity church, Fort Worth, Texas, who will be tried for heresy soon after January 1 for his denial of the virgin birth as a physical fact.

The Rev. Stuart Tyson, vice president of the Churchmen's union has characterized the development as the most important matter in the generation.

He quotes Bishop Moore of Texas as considering it the beginning of a concerted movement to cleanse the church of modernism.

Supporters of the Rev. Mr. Heaton say the modernists will not stop at defense but will push a vigorous counter-attack to the next general convention of the church. Organization of a defense committee and subscriptions of a defense fund have been undertaken.

Dr. Leighton Parks, rector of St. Bartholomew's church, during services at his church yesterday, doffed surplice and stole, symbols of his priesthood and announced his rejection of the recent pastoral letter of the Episcopal house of bishops, which adjured the ministry to stand behind "the Catholic tradition" of the church and the "Nicene creed."

He challenged both the doctrine of the virgin birth and the bodily resurrection and welcomed a trial for heresy.

The Rev. Dr. Percy Stickney Grant, rector of the Church of the Ascension, who last winter engaged in a controversy with Bishop Manning, said in his sermon yesterday:

"There are many in the church, English and American, who still believe in an authority almost papal and wish practically to return to medieval ways. They have little sympathy with Protestantism."

NEW YORK.—Announcement was made of the formation of a new organization designed to crush "the principle of censorship" to be known as the "National Council to Protect the Freedom of Art, Literature and the Press."

DEADLOCK IN SENATE CONTINUES

Senator Cummins Fails to Get Place and Another Day Is Wasted—Couzens Gets Only 11 Votes—Farm Bloc Threatens to Join With Democrats Tomorrow.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The republican insurgent bloc whose revolt against the republican party leaders has delayed for two weeks complete organization of the 68th congress, stood their ground today in the senate and consolidated the gains already made in the house.

A four day truce in the deadlock over election of a chairman of the senate inter-state commerce committee ended with the insurgent group still holding out against the return of Chairman Cummins, the regular republican choice and threatening to throw their entire strength tomorrow to Senator Smith of South Carolina, democrat, in the belief that it would elect him.

In the house formal approval was given at last to the amended republican committee slate on which the leader of the house insurgents, Representative Nelson of Wisconsin, had been given a place at the last minute under a threatened coalition between the democrats and insurgents.

Mr. Nelson will serve as a member of the rules committee which shapes the legislative program.

Cummins Stumbling Block
Before it resumed balloting for an inter-state commerce committee chairman, the senate re-elected all its present officers with the exception of president pro tempore—an office now held by Senator Cummins and over which another scrap is threatened later in asking that the senate proceed to the election of its officers.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, republican leader, said the republicans considered the office of president pro tempore already filled by Senator Cummins, holdover from last session.

On the first ballot for the committee chairmanship, Senator Cummins received 43 votes, two less than the necessary majority—against 39 for Senator Smith, six for Senator Howell, Nebraska, and one for Senator Couzens, republican, Michigan.

Four of the republican insurgents—Brookhart, Iowa; Frazier and Ladd, North Dakota, and Norris, Nebraska, and the two farmer-labor senators from Minnesota, Shipstead and Johnson, voted for Senator Howell, whose own vote was cast for Senator Couzens. Senator Bruce, democrat, Maryland, again voted for Senator Cummins, but the other democrats supported Senator Smith.

Senator Cummins maintained his lead on the second ballot, but fell five votes short of the necessary majority. His vote was 41 to 39 for Smith, 9 for Couzens and 1 for Howell. All of the insurgents except Senator Norris voted for Couzens. In addition, the Michigan senator was supported by Senator Cummins and Senator Gooding, republican, Idaho and Jones, republican, Washington.

Senator Couzens continued to support Cummins and Senator Norris cast the one vote for Howell.

Shift to Couzens

The first announcement of a shift in the ranks of the regular republicans came from Senator Jones who read a statement after the first ballot announcing his intention to vote for Senator Couzens.

"It is clear that Mr. Cummins cannot be elected," he said, "and the committee should be organized in order that this matter may be cleared away. No one will dispute that the republicans have both the right and responsibility for the chairmanship. If the senior republican member cannot be elected there are other republicans upon whom we certainly should agree. On the next ballot I shall vote for the senior senator from Michigan."

The deadlock remained unbroken on the third ballot. Couzens picked up two additional votes, Senators Norris and Borah, republican, Idaho, switched to him. Cummins received 39 votes—six less than a necessary majority—

LOVE OF GUILTY COUPLE ENDURES IN SPITE OF ALL

SUPERIOR, Wis., Dec. 17.—(By The Associated Press)—In Superior today are three groups of persons, bound together in a tragic comedy of fate.

Ross Richardson and Mrs. Leona Sallstad-Richardson, who married believing the woman's husband, Edward J. Sallstad, to be dead, and Sallstad's two children, form one group. Their whereabouts in the city are unknown, but it is believed they are here.

Mrs. Augusta Sallstad, aged mother of the former Eau Claire manufacturer, who mourned her son dead, sits in the home past which he was driven on his way to jail last night.

Edward J. Sallstad and his "sunshine girl," Dorothy Anderson, one time Chicago cabaret performer, are in the Douglas county jail awaiting arraignment on a charge of arson in the case of the man and of being an accomplice in the case of the girl.

Dorothy is suffering from incipient tuberculosis and Sallstad appeared greatly harassed when brought to the jail last night from Napa, Cal., by Sheriff and Mrs. William A. Hagreen. Both prisoners appeared dejected when interviewed on their way to the jail last night and expressed undying love for each other.

Sallstad is charged with burning a cottage at Lake Nebanawbe, Wis., in August, 1920, to create the impression that he had died, so he could elope with Dorothy Anderson.

A sensational trial was held, in which his supposed widow sued eight insurance companies for \$30,000 insurance on life insurance policies held by Sallstad and after bones of a human body burned in the cottage were produced, a compromise was effected. It has later transpired that Sallstad placed the body of Allan McPhoe, a friend, in the cottage before firing it.

The prisoners will be held incommunicado pending the arrival here of District Attorney Robert E. Kennedy. The date of their arraignment has not been set.

M'ADOO SPEECH ROASTED, FACTS ARE INCORRECT

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—Recent statements of William G. McAdoo, former director general of railroads made in a Los Angeles address were challenged by George G. Boardman, secretary of the western railways committee on public relations in an address before the chamber of commerce here today.

"I challenge Mr. McAdoo to show wherein the transportation act of 1920 restored every uneconomical and wasteful practice which federal control had abolished," said Boardman. "Section 15-A of the transportation act specifically provides for the honest, efficient and economical operation of the roads, and the inter-state commerce commission, in fixing the rate of fair return, is required to satisfy itself that the roads have been honestly, efficiently and economically managed."

"Moreover, the inter-state commerce commission in a recent report said that transportation history during the current year had been marked by 'unequalled performance' of railroad service. It is unfortunate to say the least that any man who has held exceptionally responsible positions in the service of the people should make statements regarding the roads and their management which even a casual examination of the railroads would have shown him to be not supported by the facts."

D'AUTREMONT'S ARE INDICTED AGAIN

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—The federal grand jury today returned an indictment against the D'Autremont brothers, Roy, Ray and Hugh, charging "interference with a postoffice employee in discharge of his duty," in connection with the holdup of a Southern Pacific train in southern Oregon October 11.

Value Farm Crops 1923 Over 8 Billion; Greatest in Years

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Value of the country's principal farm crops this year was placed at \$8,322,695,000 today by the department of agriculture in its final estimates of the year. Revised figures of last year's crops place their value at \$7,449,904,000 and the 1921 crops at \$5,629,548,000.

The acreage of the important crops this year is placed at 350,698,100 acres, compared with 350,094,470 in 1922 and 348,431,500 in 1921.

GOLDEN SHRINE OF KING TUT IS MARVEL OF ART

All Expectations Surpassed When Coffin of Ancient Pharaoh Is Revealed to Human Gaze—Effect Declared to Be Uncanny.

LUXOR, Dec. 17.—(By Associated Press). All preconceived ideas of Tutankhamun's golden shrine were upset by the sight of this impressive coffin, for the first time disclosed in almost its full proportions by the removal of the partition wall when the correspondent visited the tomb today.

The first impression of this gigantic receptacle for the dead, its sides resplendent with decorations of blue and gold, set against a background of brightly colored paintings on yellow, was almost overwhelming. The feeling was of something incredibly bizarre—something that seemed temporarily to banish the presence of death in this casket of wonderful artistry.

One of the first details to catch the eye was the fact that the golden lid of the canopy does not, as one imagined, from the views obtained from the opening in the wall, slope down from one end to the other. It rises again at the other end, gaining a graceful curved effect which is declared by competent authority to be unique in Egyptology. The lid is not solid, but hollowed out, extending over a space of about four feet between the first and second shrines.

Remarkable Wood Rack.

In this space the correspondent was able to see—for the doors of the first shrine had been removed—a remarkable specimen of wooden rack, erected to carry the immense golden spangled linen pall resting over the second shrine. It is very like open casketwork and is painted a glistening black with gilded carved feet.

In the front where the removal of the doors of the first shrine renders it clearly visible, it is seen to be made of two parts rather awkwardly bolted together with two large bolts, probably wooden. From the top hangs the ragged edge of the pall, turned blackish brown by age, showing where the part which concealed the doors of the second shrine had broken away. This part of the pall has already been removed to the nearby laboratory.

The golden rosettes, about the size of a half dollar, with which the pall is spangled, still sparkle in the rays of the are lights. These rosettes are certainly metal, but probably not gold—more likely gilded copper.

Behind the rack the golden doors of the second shrine glisten dully, the two bolts, one above and one below, yet sternly guarding the secret tomb.

Doors Are Engraved.
In the middle, set in either baton of the doors, are two metal rings, let into the wood side by side, to which were attached seals which Howard Carter, directing the work,

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PRESIDENT NOW READY FOR BATTLE

Reports Indicate Obregon Has Completed Arrangements to Start Offensive—Quick Victory Claimed—Rebel Press Agents Continue to Report Rebellion Won.

President Obregon, according to the meager dispatches received from Mexico, has completed the organization of his western forces in their drive against the rebel stronghold of Guadalajara and has turned his attention to the east, where the rebel thrust from Vera Cruz is apparently threatening the capital.

Advices from the government side as to its military movements are almost completely lacking, but the rebel headquarters at Vera Cruz continued actively to claim results.

The rebels say they hold Puebla City and Cuatla, the two points of a triangle which has Mexico City as its apex. Cuatla is only 46 miles south-east of the capital. The rebels also claim further defections from government forces in Guerrero and Tabasco. General Obregon's private secretary in a message received at the Mexican border, says the president is confident his troops will remain loyal and that the uprising will quickly be quelled. He is encouraged, the message says, not only by expressions of loyalty from the farmers and workers, but by reports of differences among the rebel leaders, some of whom are declared to be seeking the elimination of De La Huerta.

EL PASO, TEXAS, Dec. 17.—The outstanding development of the revolutionary movement, as far as that section of Mexico bordering the Texas line is concerned, was the arrest here late last night of a man giving the name of Carlos Lopez, said to be a revolutionary leader.

Francisco Torreblanca, private secretary to President Obregon, has wired the El Paso Times that "the first formal fighting probably will occur Sunday or Monday" and he added that all probabilities indicate the rebel forces will be completely routed. Reports from Vera Cruz early today of the capture of the city of Cuatla, in the state of Morelos, by rebel forces, indicate that there may be some real activity in the vicinity of the section in which the revolutionists are operating.

A report from Fabens stated that a revolutionary force of forty men attacked federal troops at Guadalupe and three men were killed. Federals drove the revolutionists into the hills, the report said.

There has been no revolutionary activity near the Mexico-United States border.

VERA CRUZ, Dec. 17.—With the reported capture of Puebla and Cuatla, revolutionary headquarters here today claimed they held the two lower points of a triangle which has Mexico City, their goal, as its apex. Cuatla, which was taken yesterday, according to an insurgent communique, is within sixty miles of the capital.

Generals in command of the occupying forces in the two cities are in close communication. It was stated at headquarters here. General Villalaz is reported in command at Puebla. General Ambrosio Figueroa in the state of Guerrero and General Jose LaGunes, operating in the border states of Yucatan and Tabasco, have broken with the Obregon government the statement asserted.

General Figueroa claims complete control of Guerrero except for the town of Chilpancingo, which, according to the rebel leaders, he plans to take today, attacking with his command of 2000 men.

General Lazunes is reported co-operating with the insurgent forces in an attack upon Villa Hermosa.

STEAL ASHES MURDERED JAP RED; PHOTOGRAPH IS USED FOR CORPSE

TOKIO, Dec. 17.—(By Associated Press). A tense situation prevails here as a result of theft of the ashes of the body of the late Sakaye Ougui, socialist leader, who was slain, with his wife and child, after being arrested, by Captain Anakasu, gendarmier officer.

Socialists, aroused over the desecration of the remains of their leader, have threatened reprisals against the anti-socialist league and the headquarters of the latter organization are being closely guarded against attack.

MILK WAR IN TACOMA

TACOMA, Dec. 17.—The milk war here between the Pierce County Dairymen's association and independent distributors came to a head this afternoon with the announcement of the association that it would begin selling milk at eight cents a quart tomorrow.

M. CLEMENCEAU BADLY HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT, JOKES WITH HIS DOCTORS

PARIS, Dec. 17.—M. Clemenceau was resting comfortably today in his home after yesterday's automobile accident on the Nantes-Paris road, in which he was painfully cut about the face by flying glass. His doctors state that he requires a week's complete rest. The stitches will be removed from his face and lip next Saturday. He joked today with members of his

family despite doctors' orders to the contrary. He is finding great difficulty in speaking, owing to his deeply cut lip and a plate which has been placed in his mouth.

"I cannot eat and that is a misfortune," the "Tiger" said, "but neither can I talk, and that is a terrible blow."

All he could take was liquid food, administered through a straw.
