

DIST. ATTY. GOES TO CALIFORNIA FOR EXTRADITION

District Attorney Newton W. Borden left Monday night for Sacramento, California to apply to the governor of that state for extradition papers for W. K. Martin, stock and bond salesman, held by Siskiyou county authorities, at the request of Jackson county authorities, on charges alleging misrepresentation and fraud. Martin resists extradition. According to Sheriff Terrill, and the attorney for one of the alleged victims, Martin sold Verdin Canning stock for \$100 when it was listed in stock markets at \$22. Several local and Jackson county people are said to have invested between \$25,000 and \$50,000 in the stock, at the latter figure.

The extradition hearing is scheduled to be heard tomorrow morning.

REBEL CITY IS CAPTURED

A big drive against the revolutionists at San Marcos, Puebla, 160 miles from Mexico City probably would be underway today, according to another telegram from General Francisco Serrano, secretary of war and marine.

Ten men were killed in engagements in the vicinity of Guadalupe Sunday in a clash with fiscal gendarmes, officers here were advised unofficially. At San Ignacio, whence a part of the insurrectionists fled, eight men, including fiscal guards and soldiers were killed, the reports added.

VERA CRUZ, Dec. 18.—Rebel headquarters at an early hour this morning were still without information as to the progress of the battle of Apazaco and San Marcos, two important railway towns about 75 miles east of Mexico City.

Reinforcements sent from Vera Cruz yesterday to the aid of the rebel generals at both places, were not expected to come up for some time because the railway lines have been torn up.

Oregon Leads Attack

The battle of San Marcos, according to reports received here, is said to have been started by Obregon troops. The insurgents in the Apazaco battle, which raged all day yesterday are in command of Generals Maycotte and Villareal. The federals are under command of General Martinez.

A dispatch received by the Mexican consulate at Nogales, Ariz., last night said that General Maycotte had rebel-

led with part of his command and that he had issued a proclamation protesting against the acts of the co-operating party.

A communique issued by the Huestistas reports that Guadalupe, in the state of Chihuahua has fallen into rebel hands. It is stated that General Rosillo Hernandez has gone into revolt in Boquilla del Carmen, Coahuila and is beginning to organize volunteer forces.

Would Seize Gunboat

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 18.—Appeal to United States Attorney Joseph Burke is contemplated by Mexican

Consul Ferreira, in an effort to have the gunboat Mayo now in port here, either seized or prevented from leaving the harbor. It was stated at the consulate today as a result of officers and crew of the warship announcing that they recognized Adolfo De La Huerta as provisional president of the Mexican republic.

First news of the decision of the men aboard the Mexico came in an announcement by the commander of the Mayo that officers and crew would accept orders from the provisional government headed by De La Huerta as it was declared that under the Mexican constitution President Obregon was no longer qualified to lead the government.

Obregon Well Equipped

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 18.—(By Associated Press). President Obregon with 22,000 troops under his command is concentrating his forces in the state of Vera Cruz and engagements with rebel forces are expected momentarily, according to an official communique received here today by Consul General Alejandro Lubbert.

The federal army, the communique stated, is thoroughly equipped for the campaign in the state of Vera Cruz, with light and heavy artillery, machine guns, cavalry and infantry and a large air force. The president has publicly stated that he will press the campaign on to an attack on the city of Vera Cruz.

President Obregon up to yesterday

had been in personal touch with the federal forces under General Joaquin Amara engaging the rebels in front of Guadalupe, the communique said. The rebel troops under General Estrada offered no resistance to federal troops and have been in constant retreat toward Guadalupe, destroying railroads and bridges to prevent the advance of federal troops.

Rebels Claim Victory

EL PASO, Texas, Dec. 18.—Rebel forces have advanced from the city of Puebla toward the station of Apizaco, an important junction on the railway, and will attack the headquarters of President Obregon there, according to advices received by the De La Huerta junta here today.

Generals Villareal and Castro, commanding a large body of insurgents, are threatening to cut off the rear of the federal army, the advices said.

Large amounts of war material have been captured by the rebels, together with prisoners, the junta was advised. Many of the Obregon troops have deserted to join the banner of the De La Huerta movement, according to rebel advices.

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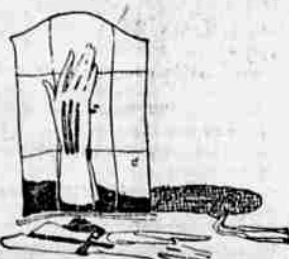

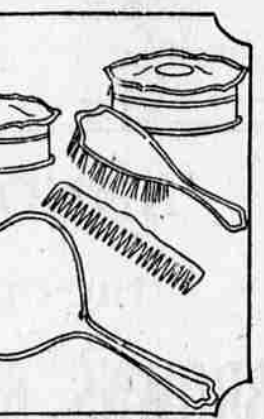
