MORE GUARDS FOR ART TREASURES IN FRANCE NEEDED

PARIS—The recent theft of two rare Gobelin tapestries from the Versailles palace has alarmed government authorities. The curators have not funds enough to police in really efficient fashion the palaces and museums where treasures worth billions of francs are kept, but several short-cuts to safety have been proposed.

The first precaution was an order forbidding guards and guides to tell visitors of the great value of the treasures exhibited. That would be tempting the devil," the curator at Versailles said.

The difficulty of guarding the palaces becomes apparent when it is realized that at Fontainebleau there are 2000 rooms to be patrolled by a few guards, who much prefer to sleep.

The plans now before the authorities call for an electric burglar alarm system; flooding the outside of the buildings with light, and providing the guards with police dogs. Another project is to use soldiers in the guarding of these art treasures.

GOVERNOR PIERCE AT FARM MEET

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 19.—The farmers union in convention here is holding closed sessions today, considering matters pertaining to the organization and farm conditions and problems. About 300 farmers are in attendance. Governor Pierce, himself a farmer of Union county, is chairman of the committee on taxation.

The delegates will be guests tonight at a banquet tendered by the chamber of commerce. Governor Pierce and Paul V. Maris of Oregon Agricultural college will be the principal speakers. President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon will give the address of welcome at the banquet. R. A. Shumway of Milton will give the response. Carl G. Washburne, president of the chamber, will preside as toastmaster.

RECORD LIQUOR HAUL, SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Dec. 19.—Police today were hunting the owners of liquor they seized last night in a padlocked room in a stable near the retail district and which they valued at \$25,000. The seizure was announced as the largest capture of liquor in the history of the Seattle police, the next in size having been 130 cases found in coal bunkers last January.

Last night's capture included 20 kinds of whiskey, vermouth and wines. Two hundred and thirty cases were counted. A watchman, who police said probably had nothing to do with bringing the booty into the city, was arrested.

The raid on the stable followed a telephone call from an anonymous source.

HOPPE INCREASES LEAD, COCHRAN'S CHANCE SLIGHT

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—Welker Cochran, young Pacific coast expert, faces the almost impossible handicap of playing Willie Hoppe, two to one, if he takes the 18.2 balk line billiard championship here tonight in the third 500-point block of their 1500 point play-off of their recent tournament tie.

Leading 500 to 203 after the first night's play, Hoppe swept far into the lead last night when he gained another 500 against Cochran's 233, giving him a lead of 1000 to 435. To win tonight, Cochran must make 1064 points, while Hoppe's task is to obtain the conventional 500.

Hoppe left the balls in good position at the foot of the table for resumption of play at eight o'clock tonight. For the two nights, Hoppe has an average of 55-18 and Cochran 24-4-18. Hoppe's high run is 211, which he made the first night. Cochran has been unable to better the 89 he registered in the first inning of Monday night's block.

SEATTLE, Dec. 19.—Three knockouts featured the boxing card here last night. Frank Cheeklock, Bremerton welterweight, knocked out Frankie Edwards of San Francisco in the second round of their scheduled six round bout. John Budnick, Seattle heavyweight knocked out "Tiny" Bott of Los Angeles in the second round. Freddie Mack, Seattle lightweight knocked out Billy Morrow of Spokane in the fifth round. Bob Dudley, Oakland middleweight received the decision over Travis Davis of Everett in the main event of the evening. "Sailor" Dawald, U. S. S. Idaho, received the decision over Billy Quilter, Seattle bantamweight.

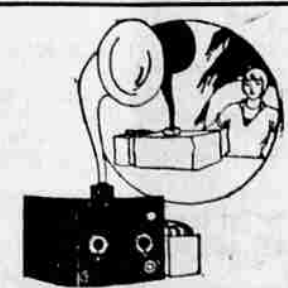
