

GOLD HILL LADS ARRESTED AFTER DANCE MIX-UP

As the result of a group of Gold Hill men being intoxicated, fighting and raising other disturbance at a public dance at Tolo last Saturday night arrests were made, and county prohibition officer Sander has been busy ever since in gathering evidence for prosecution.

It is charged that the disturbers were first ejected from the dance hall, then that they got into a fight outside, and still later reentered the dance hall by breaking down the entrance door.

Last Monday Joe Hammersley, Ed Wyatt and Joe Lewis, who were the first to be arrested, were brought up in Justice Taylor's court in this city. Wyatt and Lewis pleaded guilty and were fined \$50 each. Hammersley pleaded not guilty and his hearing was continued to some time this afternoon.

Yesterday two more arrests were made, but as they are youths claimed to be under age, they were given into custody of the juvenile court. Also yesterday Wyatt was rearrested on a charge of possessing liquor, to which he pleaded not guilty, and his hearing was also set for this afternoon in Justice Taylor's court.

FRESNO METHODS OF DEVELOPMENT ENTHUSE FORUM

One of the best speeches ever heard at a Forum luncheon was made at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon at the Hotel Medford at noon today by Guy Leonard, secretary of the Fresno Chamber of Commerce and the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Leonard of this city.

Mr. Leonard told of the growth and development of the Chamber of Commerce in Fresno and compared it to Medford, as both cities are in much the same positions, being the centers of agricultural and intensely cultivated valleys. He showed the Chamber of Commerce of Fresno to be developed into four departments—the agricultural, tourist development, industrial and social; and the greatest of these and the one that receives 70 per cent of the effort and money of the community is the agricultural department, because it is on the farmer that the prosperity of the country depends and the increasing difficulty to keep the farmers on their land and to make the land produce proper wages and profits makes this necessary. Therefore the Chamber of Commerce devotes its energy to obtaining proper irrigation, cooperative markets and proper transportation, rural schools and fairs and even spends money on bands that make farm life more enjoyable.

The tourist development is with Fresno also of great importance and they see to the development of highways, advertising their valley and the providing of proper hotels and accommodations. In this department comes the national parks that are great magnets to draw the people of the east.

But the greatest factor of the development of Fresno has been overcoming the narrowness of scope and purpose that seems to inhabit all small cities and the realizing that all benefits the surrounding cities and villages benefits her also. ticket. Both had sufficient signatures and the secretary of state will inform the candidates that the petitions have been approved.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Henry Ford's announcement in favor of President Coolidge furnished a double barreled sensation to political circles in the national capital. At the White House it was received with undisguised satisfaction and it was said the president would send Mr. Ford a personal telegram of thanks.

Among the democrats there was an evident conviction that the air had been cleared considerably with respect to the nomination of a democratic presidential candidate in 1924.

Everywhere among the old line party leaders the feeling was that no considerable Ford third party movement seemed likely now.

The statement of Mr. Ford did not come altogether as a surprise to those active in the promoting of Mr. Coolidge's candidacy for the republican nomination.

The manufacturer spent about half an hour in conference with the president about a week ago and afterward officials said their talk had been quite satisfactory. No intimation was given at the time however, that the question of presidential candidates was discussed.

The conference took place just before the president delivered his message to congress and it was understood he went over the general outline of the message with Mr. Ford.
