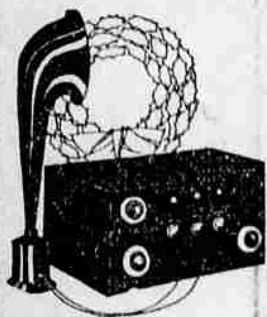

U. S. EXPERTS WILL STUDY CONDITIONS GERMAN CHILDREN

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Dr. Haven Emerson of Columbia university and Dr. Ernest Patterson of the University of Pennsylvania sailed last Saturday to make a survey of conditions in Germany for the American committee for relief of German children of which General Henry T. Allen is chairman. Just before his departure, Dr. Emerson said he had not been in Germany since 1920, and was therefore unable to make any advance statements as to the conditions he expected to find there. It was his purpose he declared to make a thorough study of the situation and to make his report as soon as possible.

Dr. Emerson is professor of public health administration at Columbia, was president of the board of health of New York City from 1915 to 1917, and is one of the foremost authorities on the subject in the United States. He served as a colonel in the medical corps in France during the war and was given the Medaille des Eplendies and made an Officer of the Legion of Honor by the French government. Dr. Patterson is professor of economics at the Wharton school of the University of Pennsylvania.

The announcement that such a commission was to be sent to Germany was made by General Allen in his reply to a cablegram from President Ebert of Germany. General Allen assured President Ebert in his message that he appreciated the necessity of immediate action if Germany's undernourished children are to be saved from starvation and informed him that the American Quakers, who are in charge of feeding, have several hundred thousand dollars' worth of foodstuffs already on the way to Hamburg.

Scottish Rite Meets, Portland. PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30.—The 49th semi-annual reunion of Scottish Rite Masons of Oregon opens here today. 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MISSING BROKER HOLDS UP SENATE OIL INVESTIGATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Failure of the United States marshal at New York to serve a subpoena for Jesse Livermore, Wall street operator, led to further postponement today of the inquiry by the senate public lands committee into fluctuations of oil stock before and after the leasing of naval oil reserves.

Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, in charge of the interrogation of witnesses, insisted that Livermore be placed on the stand first and declined to call out of order representatives of the Chase National bank and the Chase securities company who have been on the stand several days.

Henry B. Sterns, counsel for the two New York institutions, protested that continued absence of the Case officials from desks at this season would seriously embarrass their work and asked that "in simple courtesy the facts offered to the committee by these witnesses be taken now to offset so far as possible press reports which have definitely connected our clients with the subject under inquiry."

"I must be allowed to conduct the inquiry in my own way," replied Senator Walsh. "I had planned to take Mr. Livermore first and it would complicate matters to alter this plan. There seems, unfortunately, to be some difficulty in finding that witness, although my information is that his whereabouts should be easily determined."

The committee adjourned subject to call of the chairman when the missing witness is found.
