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ALIEN SMUGGLERS,
CANADIAN LINE
GET \$40 PER HEAD

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 20.—Twenty to forty dollars per head is the fare smugglers along the Niagara frontier collect from aliens seeking illegal entrance into the United States. Business was said to be brisk. Hundreds of aliens, stranded in Canada with the filling of the American immigration quotas are willing to pay in advance for passage. The transaction is equally profitable for the smuggler regardless of his success or failure in penetrating the customs lines. He gives no refund when his charges are caught.

At Youngstown on the lower river, where the smugglers' hazards are increased by the proximity of Fort Niagara and the coast guard station, the quoted price on good authority is \$40. At Lewiston, further up the river, it drops to \$20.

Passage over the international bridge at Niagara Falls is sold at an average price of \$25. Immigration authorities cite numerous instances in which aliens have paid that sum in advance, only to be turned back or taken into custody.

Dairying and Chickens
To the Editor: My attention has been drawn in a late issue of your Medford Mail Tribune to an article regarding calves which Mr. Cate is offering to have shipped from Tillamook for the benefit of your dairymen in Rogue River valley.

This is a subject which I feel can not be commended too highly and I am asking you to give that article, and also the enclosed from the Sunset Magazine, all the publicity your valued paper can afford.

No man or men under our present mode of living can survive under the old rule; in other words, wait for a hay or grain crop to mature and then expect to have shipped from Tillamook for the benefit of your dairymen in Rogue River valley.

The remedy is in his own hands—milk a string of cows, have a flock of White Leghorns, consume what he raises on his own land, and encourage the building and operating of a creamery and cheese factory in his locality.

In view of the fact that the climate of your valley is particularly attractive and favorable to the dairying industry, and that a feed ration second to none can be produced, this would provide the remedy and bring prosperity to a very large number of your inhabitants. Yours very truly,

If You Want Independence, Go Dairying

The one great subdivision of agriculture that has flourished and prospered continuously in war and peace, in good times and bad, is dairying. The little old cream check coming in every two weeks has put more farmers on Easy Street than all the spectacular fruit profits put together. Underlying the success of the dairy farmer are two basic reasons: He puts in more productive labor hours than other farmers, having to work seven days a week the year round, and he has a market which enables him to sell his output at all times with but slight price fluctuations.

The American dairy farmer has always had the opportunity to put in long hours every day in the year, but he probably does not realize how his home market has been strengthened by the growth of the export market for American evaporated, condensed and powdered milk. In the ten years preceding the war this export market absorbed American milk products with a value of \$17,000,000. In the decade since the outbreak of the war milk products with a value of \$400,000,000 have been exported. You and I are paying a little more for our

fresh milk and cream, on account of these exports, but we should not begrudge the dairy farmer the extra cent per quart. His prosperity means better business for us, and, anyhow, most of us would be unwilling to milk a string of cows seven hundred and thirty times a year no matter how large the profit might be.

To the dairymen of the Pacific coast the export market offered by the Orient is of special significance. The Orient is beginning to consume milk in increasing quantities, but few of the Oriental countries have land and forage enough for dairy herds. The United States with 110,000,000 people has 65,000,000 cattle, of which 25,000,000 are dairy cows; China with nearly four times the population has only 22,000,000 cattle of all varieties while Japan with 55,000,000 people has less than a million dairy cows. As the milk appetite and the purchasing power of their countries increase, the dairy farmers of the Pacific coast will have to augment their herds to keep pace with the demand.
