PROFESSOR HAS A DEVICE THAT MAY MAKE DEAF HEAR

EVANSTON, Ill., Dec. 20.—Every indication points to success in developing a hand-device which the totally deaf may carry and by which they may receive impressions of oral speech, Professor Robert H. Gault, head of the psychology department of Northwestern University, announced here today.

Professor Gault bares his announcement on the progress of a year of intensive work on the problem, and in making experiments in detecting words and sentences by tactual contact.

"Today it is safe to say that the human being can feel sound waves by touch, and can clearly translate such tactual impressions into words and sentences," said Prof. Gault.

More than a year ago Prof. Gault started work with two students, George and John Crane, brothers of Fort Wayne, Ind., and succeeded in communicating with a metal tube various words and sentences which the Crane brothers detected with the hand only.

At that time one of the brothers sat in a room and spoke through the tube while the other, in an adjoining room, ears muffled with her hand over the receiving end of the tube, announced the interpretation of the sound vibrations. This year Prof. Gault has been utilizing an acoustical system for amplifying vibrations at the sending end while he employs a small receiving disk held in the hand at the other. Prof. Gault himself has been working upon the long vowels and upon several short sentences, which a graduate student, S. N. Stevens, sitting in an adjoining building 60 feet away, repeats.

Prof. Gault says the long vowels, a, e, i, o, and u, are more difficult to detect than are sentences. However, by long and patient practice, he says he has reached a point where he "feels" the long vowels correctly about 85 per cent of the time. Upon sentences he does better, he explains because of the stressing of words.

WASHINGTON, Dec.—Federal inspection laws have been in operation for 17 years. During this time more than 3,500,000 whole carcasses and more than 12,000,000 parts of carcasses have been condemned and made unfit for food purposes through the vigilance of federal meat inspectors.

HOPPE BEATEN IN FINAL GAME, BUT WINS THE TITLE

CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—Willie Hoppe again has gone through the familiar process of being acclaimed a world's champion. Tied by Welker Cochran, the California youth in the recent New York international tournament, Hoppe emerged victorious 1500 to 1161 last night after a three nights playoff for the title.

Hoppe, still the master billiardist and match game strategist, lost the final block to the young coast player by 225 points, but came through easily by virtue of a long lead he had piled up against just such an emergency by taking the opening night's block 500 to 203 and the second installment 500 to 233.

TED THYE REGAINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20.—Ted Thye, Portland light-heavyweight, won two out of three falls from Mike Yokel of Salt Lake City in a wrestling match here last night. This victory gives Thye the light-heavyweight championship belt which he lost to Billy Edwards, who passed it on to Yokel. A big crowd saw the match which proved to be a thriller.

The first fall went to Thye in 27 minutes ten seconds, with an arm scissors. Yokel took the second fall with a headlock in 18 minutes 45 seconds, and the third and deciding fall went to Thye in nine minutes ten seconds on a wrist lock and arm scissors.

O. A. C. to Play Nebraska
CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 20.—Oregon Agricultural college football team will play the University of Nebraska at the opening of Nebraska's new stadium, seating 30,000, on Thanksgiving day next year. This decision was reached by the board of control yesterday when Nebraska's invitation and guarantee were accepted.
