The first \$100,000 of the million dollar bond issue of Jackson county roads was paid November 1st, when due, by the county treasurer, and the redeemed bonds, have been returned cancelled by the National Park bank of New York City, the fiscal agency of the county, in the handling of the bonds. The next batch of bonds for \$100,000 is due November 1, 1928, and every five years thereafter until paid in full.

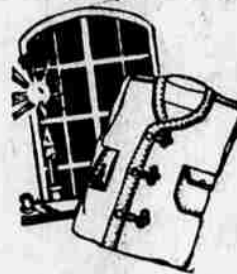
