SPECIAL CHRISTMAS CHURCH SERVICES AT PRESBYTERIAN

The plans for the Christmas services at the Presbyterian church will be changed somewhat from that of former years. The sacred concert which has been given by the quartet and which has attracted so much attention in former years, has usually been given on the Sabbath evening preceding Christmas. This year the quartet will give their concert Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock hour, Sunday, the 23rd. The quartet consisting of Miss Gertrude Parker, soprano; Miss Edna Steiner, alto, and A. J. MacDonough, tenor, and Dr. W. W. Howard, bass, assisted in a male trio by Mr. John Kirkpatrick, bass, have been practicing for several weeks and promises some excellent numbers. Mrs. H. E. Marsh will be at the organ as usual. The Sunday school entertainment will be given this year by the pupils of the junior and intermediate and senior departments of the school. They will give a Christmas cantata entitled "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks," by Lowden. It will be given on Sunday evening next, at 7:30 p. m. Instead of on Christmas eve as formerly. This year instead of the school, presenting each pupil with a sack of candy, the "White Gifts for the King" service will be used and each pupil is asked to bring some gift of food or clothing or whatever they wish as a gift to the needy of the city. These gifts will be placed at the foot of a white cross. The cantata is being prepared under the skilled direction of Mrs. I. E. Schuler and Mrs. James Collins, and will be one of the best the school has ever presented. It will be largely musical and contended to fit the various characters that center around the birth of the Savior. The beginners and primary departments are having their entertainment in the chapel of the church on Monday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. It will be in charge of Mrs. R. A. Matthews and Miss Helen Bullis with their helpers. The parents as well as the children are invited.

COPCO EMPLOYEES TO GIVE KIDDIES CHRISTMAS PARTY

Over three hundred persons have signified their acceptance of the invitations that have been issued to the Copco Forum's second annual Christmas party to be held at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of Saturday, December 22 at the Hotel Medford. These guests of the forum will include one hundred twenty-five school children of Medford. The program consists of the usual turkey dinner, followed by the distribution of gifts by Santa Claus, assisted by the Copco Cop at the Christmas tree which is now being erected and decorated. The dinner will be held in the large dining room of the hotel and the party will then adjourn to the Christmas tree in the Crater's Banquet room in the hotel basement. Alford's orchestra will furnish music during the entire afternoon. Many pleasant remembrances are had by those who attended this party last year. The Copco forum is composed of the local members of the Copco organization and the Christmas event is sponsored and financed entirely by the employees of the company. Of all the forum's activities of the year the Christmas dinner is looked forward to as the big event, and plans are worked out during the entire year for the success of this party.

PRO-WHEAT AND ANTI- DRY BILLS OFFERED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Plans to aid wheat growers by granting government loans which would permit them to purchase cattle and diversify their farming were drafted into a bill today by several members of the senate and house from the northwest. The bill would provide a \$50,000,000 fund. The loans would be for a five year period at a rate of interest not to exceed six per cent and with the cattle as security.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Amendment of the Volstead act increasing the legal alcoholic content of beverages to three per cent and removing present restrictions on issuance of physician's prescriptions was proposed in two bills today by Senator Edge, republican, New Jersey.

JUDGMENT AGAINST BANK IS SUSTAINED

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 20.—The supreme court in an en banc decision yesterday upheld the state guarantee fund board in assessing the Spokane and Eastern Trust company the sum of \$56,061.44 to be applied as its assessment to the guarantee fund which was depleted by the failure of the Scandinavian-American bank at Seattle in 1921. The Farmers' bank of Ellensburg must pay \$6,175 into the fund on a similar decision today.

FAMOUS JAPANESE SUFFERS A STROKE

TOKIO, Dec. 19.—(By the Associated Press.)—Prince Kimochi Saloni, widely known abroad because of his activity as Japanese envoy to the peace conference and for many years a leader in the Selyukai party, suffered a severe illness, amounting to a stroke today. On account of his advanced age, concern is expressed. Prince Saloni was president of the house of peers in 1893, was minister of education and temporarily of foreign affairs in the second Ito cabinet, was minister of education in the third Ito cabinet and thrice acted as premier ad interim because of his tenure of the presidency of the privy council.

California Gov. Scores Official For Kels Test

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 20.—Governor Richardson, in a statement issued here today after he had been informed that Warden J. J. Smith of Folsom prison had agreed to permit a spinal fluid test on Alex Kels, condemned murderer charged that the warden had been "intimidated" by the majority members of the state board of prison directors. The governor's statement also charged that the majority of the board, headed by C. E. McLaughlin of Sacramento, "has assumed a strange and illegal responsibility" in instructing the warden to permit the test.

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MODERNMENT PLEA IS FOR FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—The modernist faction in the Protestant Episcopal church today was compared with Belgium in 1914—wanting peace, but peace with honor—by Rev. Dr. Stuart Tyson, vice-president of the Modern Churchman's union, who put the next step in the controversy over the Heaton heresy charges squarely up to the fundamentalists. "The fight now is entirely in the hands of the other side," declared Dr. Tyson. "We have thrown down the gauntlet and will stand by our actions." "The whole issue is that of freedom of conscience. We have not the least desire to compel others to think as we do. But we do insist that we be permitted to think as our consciences dictate and do not propose to permit the fundamentalists to govern our minds." "The modernists are much in the same position as was Belgium in 1914. We want peace, but we want it with honor."

Pinkerton Left Fortune.
CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—An estate of \$1,200,000 was left by William A. Pinkerton, noted detective, who died recently, according to his will, which was filed for probate.

BILL FOR PROBE WOOD'S REGIME IS INTRODUCED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—There investigation by the house rules committee of conditions in the Philippines and Governor General Wood's administration is proposed in a resolution drafted by Representative Frear, republican, Wisconsin, for introduction today. Mr. Frear quotes certain news dispatches cabled from Manila which referred to alleged misconduct by some American and insular government officials. In conclusion he makes this taken into custody. "That the rules committee of the house is instructed to investigate and report to the house as soon as possible all allegations as herein set forth relating to the truth or falsity of the Manila cablegrams, the actions of Governor Wood in relation to the Philippine government, its legislation, its banks, its railways, sugar centrals and efforts, if any, to exploit the island by American commercial interests, the deposit of Philippine government money in American banks, the facts regarding Filipino stable government and any other matters proposed for a full report thereon to aid congress in preparing any remedial legislation." Discussing the need of a searching inquiry, Mr. Frear declares that congress should make a full report "of any senators, representatives or other public officials who have received money to influence their attitude toward Philippine independence as repeatedly charged in the different cablegrams quoted."

He also asserts that the investigation proposed "should disclose all valid objection, if any, against having the American congress now declare the Philippine islands now are and of right ought to be, free and independent."

The resolution calls attention to dispatches published last May in various American newspapers in which it was declared "Governor Wood had in his possession a list of names of senators, representatives and others prominent in Washington social life who receive payment from the Philippine independence commission. It also refers to charges made in some quarters that Governor Wood has usurped power and has assumed the role of dictator."

MAPLE FLOOR TRUST ORDERED DISSOLVED

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Dec. 20.—Dissolution of the Maple Flooring Manufacturers association was ordered by Judge C. W. Sessions in United States district court here today. The order was entered upon a motion of the government which charged the association was an unlawful organization operating in restraint of trade.
