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17 DAYS WASTED BY SENATE FUSS OVER CUMMINS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Congress began a two week's holiday recess today with senate organization still incomplete and a practically blank record of legislative accomplishment since it assembled on December 3.

With some of its committees functioning during the holidays, the house will be able to get down to the serious business after it reassembles on January 3. The senate, however, will come back to renew its efforts to break the deadlock over the chairmanship of the inter-state commerce committee unless it should prove possible for leaders to effect some sort of a compromise in the meantime.

With the two ballots taken yesterday to defer further balloting until after the recess, only business of a purely routine character faced the two houses today.

With the two ballots taken yesterday the senate ran the consecutive string to twenty-five which sets a precedent for voting of this kind so far as official can find from their search of the records.

ZEROLENE HAS LOW COLD TEST

"What is meant by the 'cold test' of an oil?" This is a question which seems to baffle the average motorist, and yet the explanation is comparatively simple.

As a result the engine fails to receive the proper lubrication. This may cause scored cylinders and burnt-out bearings, and will certainly result in excessive wear on bearing surfaces.

So, during the cold weather season now commencing it will pay the motorist to adopt a good cold-test oil. This group includes President Coolidge, the members of the cabinet, Chief Justice Taft, Senator Lodge, Speaker Clegg, Will H. Hays, Albert B. Fall, John T. Adams, Albert D. Lasker, George Harvey, Senator Cummins, Fred W. Upham, John Barton Payne, John Hays Hammond, Edward B. McLean, Charles G. Dawes and Warren R. Martin.

BILL ENDORSES NAVAL BASE AT ALAMEDA, CALIF.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Sale of a number of government tracts and acquisition of new land is proposed in an omnibus bill prepared today by Representative Britton, Illinois, a member of the naval committee, at the request of the navy department.

The measure would authorize acceptance by the government of the 5340 acres offered by the city of Alameda, Cal., as a site for a naval base and also continue operation of Mare Island navy yard for shipbuilding and fleet repair work.

An appropriation of \$19,450,000 for improvements at Alameda and \$5,859,500 at Mare Island to be spread over twenty years would be authorized.

Referring to the proposed creation of the Alameda base, Mr. Britton said that "all military experts agree that the navy's greatest weakness is the lack of a base on the Pacific coast."

The director of the budget has de-

clared, he added, that the bill is not in conflict with the financial program of the president.

Establishment of a naval air station at Sand Point, Wash., is proposed as is the purchase for \$400,000 of the town of Quantico, Va., as an addition to the marine corps camp there.

Other purchases would be made as follows:

South Brooklyn, N. Y., for naval supply station at a cost not to exceed \$330,000; Marine flying field at Quantico, \$20,000; rifle range at Puget Sound, Wash., \$35,000.

The following properties would be sold:

Former naval reservations at Mission Rock, San Francisco, and a rifle range at Puget Sound, Wash.

THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS TO CONVEY IN INDIANA

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. — Students from approximately one thousand theological seminaries and colleges throughout the United States and Canada will be here this month-end for the biennial convention of the Student Volunteer movement. The meetings will begin December 25, and continue daily until January 1. Arrangements have been made to care for more than 6000 visitors. It was stated, among them several hundred colored students.
