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MAN AND WIFE
CONVICTED FOR
SLAYING ROOMER

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Ernest Vetter and his wife, Marie, today were found guilty of first degree manslaughter for the killing of Alonzo J. Storey, a former suitor of Mrs. Vetter, Mrs. Vetter screamed and collapsed when the verdict was announced. Her husband put his arm around her and spoke consolingly to her.

The maximum penalty that may be imposed on the vetters for first degree manslaughter is twenty years imprisonment.

Storey was a former roomer and intimate friend of Mrs. Vetter before he married. The prosecution introduced testimony purporting to show that Storey was invited to the Vetter home by Mrs. Vetter May 11, last, and was beaten and stabbed to death by the husband and wife. His body, wrapped in a burlap sack, was cast into Jamaica Bay. The vetters pleaded self-defense.

Chinese Bandit Who
Captured Americans
Is Executed By Govt.

PEKING, Dec. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—Sun Mai Yo, one of the bandit leaders who participated in an attack on the Shanghai-Peking express train near Suchow, in the province of Kiangsu, last May, in which a number of Americans and other foreigners were kidnapped and held captive for more than a month, has been executed at Taichow, in Chekiang province, according to advices received by the war ministry here.
