S. D. COURT DECIDES JOHNSON MUST GO ON SEPARATE TICKET

PIERCE, S. D., Dec. 21.—Work of circulating petitions to have the names of Senator Hiram Johnson of California and his delegates and alternates and electors placed on the ballot for the South Dakota presidential primaries in March, is expected to be started at once, following a decision of the state supreme court here last night. The court ruled that Johnson's name if filed as an independent candidate for the republican presidential nomination in the primaries will have to appear separately on one petition with his delegates and alternates to the national convention on another and electors on a third.

Petitions for independent filings must be in Mr. Coyne's office by January 1.
