GREATEST U. S. HERO

IS MUSTERED OUT

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 22.—The United States army today lost its greatest hero. Master Sergeant Samuel Woodfill, designated by General Pershing as "the outstanding American soldier in the World war," and the possessor of ten military decorations was retired with full military honors at Fort Benjamin Harrison here.

Sergeant Woodfill stood at attention in a dreary rain and heard himself mustered out of the army after 22 years and five months of service.
