RECENTLY DEPOSED
RUSSIAN POPE IS
REGAINING POWER

MOSCOW, Dec. 24.—Within six months of his release from prison pending trial Patriarch Tikhon, who was deposed and deprived of his priesthood by the new church authorities, has so far succeeded in regaining control of the church that the clergymen who unfrocked him are now making every effort to effect a compromise with him.

The new Holy Synod has called an all Russian church council for January 15, and has invited Tikhon to appear before it. Archbishop Evdokim, head of the synod, admitted in a conversation with the correspondent that the conference may never be held if Tikhon declines to attend. The new church group insists that it was legally and canonically correct in deposing and unfrocking the patriarch, and contends that sooner or later the soviet government will bring the patriarch to trial.

If the church council does meet, it is expected to reveal dozens of petty differences and several bitter feuds that have developed within the various new church movements during the past year. One group wishes to unfrock Antonin, the archbishop of Moscow and head of the church of the regeneration movement. Another group is said to be very anxious to attack Archbishop Vedensky, the fiery orator who swayed the previous church council in its denunciation of Tikhon.

EXPECT SHARP FROST
FOR CHRISTMAS DAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—No "white" Christmas is in prospect but there will be a bite in the air Christmas morning in marked contrast to the conditions of the last few days when summertime weather has prevailed over a wide area.

Light frost is predicted for tonight as far south as northern Florida. The only snowfall probable is predicted for portions of northern New England and northern New York and this may turn to local rains.

CAMPAIGNS LEAGUE OF NATIONS
REVIVED IN SWITZERLAND

GENEVA, Dec. 24.—Newspapers of Switzerland report a renewal of campaigns throughout the country in behalf of the League of Nations as an organism of benefit to humanity.

Speakers at public meetings have emphasized that it is to the existence of the league of nations with its aim of conciliation and arbitration that Switzerland owes the fact that France has accepted in principle the submission of the controversy over the customs zones to settlement by arbitration.

Swiss Lose Heavily Abroad. BERNE, Dec. 24.—Switzerland has lost \$1,000,000,000 since the beginning of the world war because of the depreciation of Swiss investments abroad. The practical wiping out of Swiss money invested in Germany, Austria, Russia and Hungary accounts for more than nine-tenths of the loss.

Polo Player Is Killed. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 24.—Julian Burrell Huff, a member of the Bryn Mawr polo team, died last night in the Bryn Mawr hospital from a cerebral hemorrhage brought on by injuries received in polo practice several months ago, according to physicians. He was 41 years old.

STATISTICS SHOW
HOW NEGROES ARE
MOVING TO NORTH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—The center of negro population in the United States has been determined by the Census Bureau as 1.5 miles north-northeast of Rising Fawn, in Dade county, Georgia. For the first time in history this center has moved to the northeast, its former movements having been in a southwesterly direction.

"The present northeasterly movement was due principally to the great increase in the negro population of Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. The total increase in the negro population of the United States was 635,368, and the increase in the northern states noted was 56 per cent of the total increase. This begins north of the negro population was due mainly to the expansion of certain industries during the World War, the high wages paid being the great attraction. It is probably true that this movement has been continued due to the reduction of the cotton crop and the demand for common labor at higher wages in the north."
