

VATICAN TO SEND RADIO MESSAGES, PROTESTANTS, ALSO

(CHICAGO, Dec. 26.—(By the Associated Press)—To disseminate more widely the religious teachings of Christianity, radio broadcasting is soon to be undertaken by many of the larger denominations, according to an article in the forthcoming issue of the Radio Digest.

The magazine sets out that active steps already have been taken by several Christian churches to utilize radio communication as a means of reaching millions of persons who might have no other contact with the religion.

"The vatican will, in a few months, adopt radio to spread the word of the pope to millions over the world," the article declared. "Due to efforts of a company headed by Guglielmo Marconi, radio inventor, a broadcasting station may be opened soon in the vatican."

"Of similar magnitude is the probable scheme of Protestant churches, particularly in the United States," the writer continued. "During the last few years the chiefs of Protestant denominations in this country have considered the practicability of radio as a means of spiritual regeneration."

CHRISTMAS PLAY, CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH, ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Dec. 26.—The Congregational church gave a charming Christmas program Christmas Eve. This is an annual affair and is much enjoyed by all. A very beautiful Christmas tree was in the front of the room, and a Santa Claus gave children bags of candy after the program.

First was the Scripture reading and prayer. The choir also sang some music which had been prepared for the occasion. The different Sunday school classes sang some very pretty songs. After the singing a pageant was given. This was a beautiful representation of the first Christmas and the way that it was carried out was much credit to the small children who did it. Then a clever little playlet was given in which girls impersonated foreign children. In this a screen was hung up and the girls faces were put through it. Their hands had shoes on them and another person put their hands through it. Dresses were pinned on it so that it looked as though they were really very small children. This little playlet was very amusing, especially so when one of the little girls forgot that her hand was dressed with shoes and stockings, and scratched her nose with it. There was also a pantomime of "Silent Night" done by three girls. After this little program Santa Claus appeared and distributed bags of candy to the children. One hundred and ten of the bags of candy were distributed and even then there were not enough to go around to all of the children.

A very interesting program was given by the Methodist Sunday school on Christmas Eve. The first of the program was given by the little folks in the primary department and consisted of songs and recitations, which were exceedingly good. Then a delightful pageant was given. This pageant was under the direction of Mrs. Van Fossen and was a great credit to her. The name of it was the "World's Christmas Eve." About twenty-five from the junior department participated in this. The stage was set with a family scene with a fireplace, such as any one in moderate circumstances might have. The family were gathered around the fireplace and of course the children asked their mother for a story. The part of mother was very charmingly taken by Mrs. G. W. Gregg.

The story she told was the story of Saint Christopher. Then she and the children began to talk over the customs of the children of different countries. As they would talk about a country, a little boy or girl representing that country would appear in the fireplace. Of course, all of the children were dressed in the costume fitting the country which they represented. When she told of Africa, a little African boy would appear in the fireplace and when she told of Japan, a little Japanese girl appeared there. After she told of Saint Christopher, she explained the meaning of it all to them and then the hermit, which figures in the story, appears and asks all of the children to become Saint Christopher. All of the children that have been seen in the fireplace are then seen and all of the children promise to become as much like Saint Christopher as they are able. Some of these children which appear then are represented as immigrants and some as refugees from some of the oppressed countries in Europe. Then the pageant closed with the song, "Greenland's Joy Mountain." After the pageant all of the people in the audience and the children who participated in the program were given a candy treat from the tree.

The Methodist Episcopal church gave a beautiful Christmas cantata Sunday evening. This cantata was directed by George E. Yeo, who is to be very greatly complimented on it. The cantata opened with a voluntary by Mrs. Annabel Henry, the accompanist for the evening. Then the lights were all turned out and their choir filed in singing "Silent Night" as they walked. Each of the members of the choir had a lighted candle, which made a very beautiful effect with all the lights out. As soon as they reached their places they extinguished their candles and the lights were again turned on. Then the choir sang a very beautiful song entitled, "Look Up." An alto and tenor duet, "The Angel of Light," sung by Miss Jean Anderson and G. H. Yeo was very beautiful, as was a tenor and baritone duet by H. O. Anderson and A. C. Crews. The choir sang, "Where Shall Come a Star?" and "We Have Come to Worship Him." "The Beautiful Star," a soprano solo by Mrs. E. O. Smith was greatly enjoyed by all. Two songs by the choir, "Tidings of Great Joy" with Mrs. C. V. Cary as soprano soloist, and "A Savior, Christ Is Born" with Mrs. J. E. Angwin as soprano soloist, greatly appreciated. Miss Bernice Yeo delighted the audience with a piano solo, which was expressive of the marvelous work that Miss Yeo is now doing in music. A soprano and alto duet by Mrs. Eric Weran and Mrs. J. E. Angwin entitled "Prince of Peace" was then sung, followed by a contralto solo by Miss Jean Anderson, "Mary's Song to the Christ Child." A. C. Crews sang a beautiful selection, "Sing Unto the Lord a New Song," assisted by the choir. Perhaps the most beautiful selection of the whole evening was the well known song, "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," which was sung by the mixed quartet, consisting of Mrs. E. O. Smith, Miss Jean Anderson, A. C. Crews and G. H. Yeo. The last number on the program was a song by the choir, "Christ, Our King." This cantata is perhaps one of the most beautiful that has ever been given by the Methodist church. All of the singing was beautiful and was very greatly enjoyed by all there. 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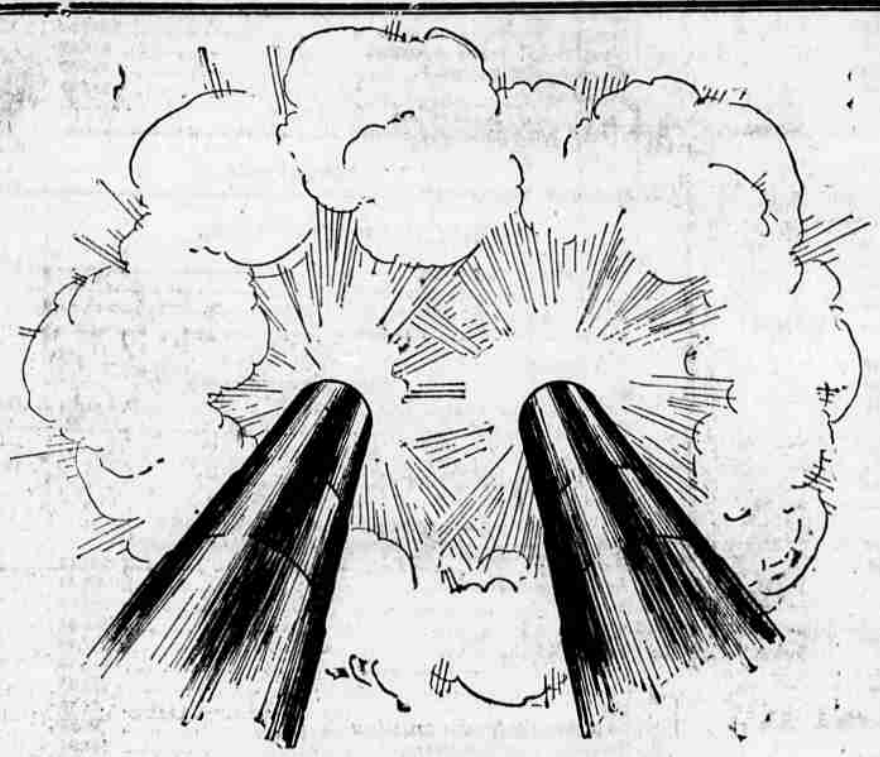
