

MORE CANDIDATES EXPECTED TO GET IN PRIMARY RACE

New names and faces are popping up daily for the primary free-for-all in the spring and the sheriff's office still leads as a lure for candidates. Nine have been mentioned for the place, two coming forth with announcements. And the end is not yet. Citizens spoken of for the tug are George B. Alden, now a deputy, Chris Gottlieb, orchardist and sportsman and Gus Nichols of Eagle Point. The last two named would go after the democratic nomination, and it is no secret that an oft-defeated Jackson county democracy is figuring on reaping something from the well known, but firmly denied split in Republican ranks, an outgrowth of the last election, when scores of republicans forgot their party faith to elect Governor Pierce. To eliminate this sickening feature, there will be a harmony meeting on Lincoln's birthday, but none expect the event to hold.

Friends of Sheriff Charles Terrill are urging him to go after the republican nomination, to which Sheriff Terrill strenuously objects, as he is anxious to get back to Lake Creek and the soil. The present sheriff has been the subject of more gossip and grand jury activity, than any sheriff in the state, but has emerged serene from a wave of political pestering and divided authority. So the sheriff is being boomed for another term, on the grounds of "vindication."

The county judgeship race promises to be a spirited affair, spring and fall. Friends of County Judge Gardner expect him to seek re-election on his record. Miles Cantrell of Rich, one of the best known farmers in southern Oregon is being urged to make the race for the republican nomination. Mr. Cantrell does not approve of the idea. Tom Simpson of Ashland, a former county commissioner, is also "spoken" of for the place.

RECORD BREAKING TOURIST CROP IS PREDICTED, 1924

Professor Irving Vining was the speaker of the day at the forum this noon giving an account of the conference that took place this morning in Medford between all the secretaries of the Chambers of Commerce of Southern Oregon. The purpose of this conference was to break down all the petty barriers that exist between the different cities in the state and to arrange for their cooperation. "People come to this state to see the great west, not to see Medford or Ashland or Klamath Falls, and we must unite in our advertising and efforts to draw people here instead of hindering and over-reaching each other," was the statement of Professor Vining.

Oregon is scheduled to receive the greatest tourist travel during the next year that she has ever had in her history and this demands two things of the Oregon people: first, advertising and boosting, and second, providing good roads and accommodations for these tourists.

At the conclusion of Professor Vining's speech, Mayor Gaddis of this city presented him with a cane as a token of appreciation for his services, his interest, his lectures and inspiring enthusiasm for this state. Irving Vining responded with a short word of thanks and the forum adjourned.

About one hundred people were present, the largest forum in months. The room was decorated with a huge Christmas tree and the tables were lighted with red candles and spread with holly and mistletoe.

The speaking began by George Andrews making a short announcement of the plans and arrangements made for the coming year. The opera, "Robin Hood," is to be given some time during the summer. George Andrews has also made arrangements with the Hunt Theater company to present every year three or more artists supreme in their line, in Medford, in the Armory, which is large enough to hold a crowd big enough to pay for such attractions at the reasonable prices. The first of these artists this year will be Madame Pavlova who is coming the 12th of January.

credit in New York and Chicago. His profits, he said were between \$700,000 and \$800,000.

"While I regard these transactions as private matters," said Lieutenant Wood to me, "I am perfectly willing to tell the story going into intimate details of my personal affairs. None of these transactions had anything to do with Philippine enterprises. Efforts were made by people here to have me invest in enterprises in the islands, but I declined to do so. Mine were all American transactions."

Profits by Exchange
"While I don't know the origin of the stories of large amounts said to have been deposited by me they probably got about through the fact that I made a practice of transferring the same amount back and forth between Manila and New York as often as occasion demanded. Favorable exchange rates governed me in this. When there was a chance to make a profit through transfer I did so."

"If the banks know you have gold they will make you a good offer for it and through that fact I transferred the same amount frequently. If I had gold deposited in New York and the exchange rate made it desirable to transfer it to Manila, I did so. It is absolutely untrue that I incorporated."

"Lieutenant Wood said he had depended for advice on a New York concern which cabled him daily as to investment conditions."
"Manila people say Lieutenant Wood's purchase of expensive automobiles caused some comment here to the effect that he was getting rich thru investments, although the more general opinion was that his money was due to the fact that his wife is a daughter of Henry B. Thompson, of Delaware, president of the United

being made by the Pacific Spruce corporation to send its tug "Go Getter" to the aid of the imperilled party, and an effort was being made to have the F. A. Dooty, a towboat, accompany the rescue tug.

The bar, too rough all day yesterday and last night to permit an open boat to cross in safety, had not quieted to a noticeable extent this morning.

The coast guard cutter crew left here Monday afternoon in response to a call from Walport, sixteen miles south, where a launch carrying Victor Webb, 18, had gone into the open sea. The boat was found yesterday dashed to pieces on the rocks.

Efforts to communicate with the boat yesterday were fruitless. It was from two and a half to three miles from shore and the coast guard station tried repeatedly to signal the boat with flash lights. No reply was received however.

Those aboard, besides Captain C. Hunt, are Chester Harwood, engineer; Ed Groenbrook, A. Gustafson, F. Calkins, Kenneth Foster, John Stockman and J. Norwood.

SEATTLE, Dec. 26.—The coast guard cutters Snohomish from Port Angeles, Wash., and Cahokia from Eureka, Cal., have been sent to the aid of eight coast guardsmen, her-bound in a small boat off Newport. Captain F. G. Dodge, district commander, with headquarters here, announced today.
