

GEORGE TUCKER IS GRANTED A PAROLE ON BOOZE CHARGE

George Tucker, a former aide of County Probation Officer Sam B. Sandefer, who pleaded guilty at the last term of court to an indictment charging possession of liquor, was granted a parole, the day before Christmas. Tucker was sentenced to 60 days in jail, and fined \$100. The fine still stands. When the guilty plea was made, an indictment charging sale of liquor, in which a number of high school students were involved, was dismissed. The parole, was granted, it is understood, owing to the physical condition of Tucker, who was injured in an auto race at Salem last fall, a plea along these lines being made by his attorney, Porter J. Neff, at the time.

Efforts are underway it is understood to have W. H. Price, the 70 year old Gold Hill bootlegger, under a six months' sentence for violation of the prohibition law, and partially paralyzed, and suffering from infirmities of age, transferred from the county jail, to the county poorfarm, where he can secure better attention. Price was sent to Multnomah county jail, to serve his sentence, and that county returned him hither in November, owing to his physical condition.

Clemency is also being sought for C. E. Lloyd, held in the county jail for forgery. Lloyd was acquitted at the last term of court, on a similar charge but was immediately re-arrested, on a bench warrant at the request of Deputy District Attorney Winfield R. Gaylord. Lloyd is alleged to have passed a check for \$250, and no preliminary action, according to the sheriff's office, has been taken relative to this last action. Lloyd is a former warder of an insane asylum, and has rendered valuable service in the care of demented patients, during his incarceration.

EX-KAISER'S STAMP COLLECTION BRINGS IN PARIS MARKETS

BERLIN, Dec. 27.—Fabulous prices have been realized from some of the rare stamps in the collection which formerly belonged to Emperor William II, which is being sold in Paris. A stamp of the Grand Ducy of Baden, only three specimens of which are in existence, brought 120,000 francs and a Spanish stamp from the middle of the last century, brought almost as much. Already more than 12,000,000 francs have been realized from the sale.

This famous collection of stamps was given to the ex-kaiser in the will of a son of the late Duchess of Galliera who had taken Austrian citizenship under the name of Count de la Renotiere. William II had instituted the sale of this stamp collection in France before the war began and the remainder of the collection was seized by the entente powers.

ANOTHER ELOPEMENT ENDS IN DIVORCE CT.

DETROIT, Dec. 27.—Hearing of the separate maintenance suit brought by Mrs. Ruth Devoy Scripps against James E. Scripps, son of William E. Scripps, publisher, was expected to be concluded in circuit court here today. Scripps, in a cross bill, is asking an absolute divorce.

The romance of the young people which began while Scripps was at Yale, culminated in an elopement in 1922.

LETTER CLUE TO S. P. BANDITS IS ALSO ABANDONED

The facetious name of P. D. Dry, railway station agent at Whitsholme, Vancouver Island, British Columbia, caused authorities investigating the Skikyou tunnel quadruple murders and train robbery of October 11th last, to investigate him. Word has been received by Sheriff Terrell, that he acted only as one, doing his bit, by furnishing what he believed to be a clue to the D'Autremont brothers, wanted as suspects in the crime.

Dry wrote a letter to the sheriff's office last month, in which he said he had talked to a man representing himself to be a logger, and answering the description of one of the brothers. The letter was turned over to special agents of the railroad, and the signature, "P. D. Dry," aroused their suspicions that maybe one of the bandit boys was trying to "kid them." The sheriff had the same notion. The "P. D." was translated as something mildly profane, and the "Dry" was taken to be a sarcastic fling at those remaining in the thirly laff.

A letter written by Hugh D'Autremont, from a New Mexico town, before he came under suspicion, in the possession of the sheriff's office was compared with the P. D. Dry letter, and some similarity noted. A postal inspector rushed to Whitsholme, to follow up the clue. He found Dry, busy at the depot, and frankly admitting he had written the letter to the Jackson county sheriff.

The father of the D'Autremont boys still has abiding faith in the innocence of his sons, and according to Willamette papers is collecting evidence in their behalf. The heartbroken parent recently made a trip to Albany, Oregon, for the purpose of eliminating the evidence against his sons, which was unearthed here, when it was learned that a revolver found near the scene of the crime, had been purchased at an Albany gun store by a person who gave his name as William Elliott and his address as 506 Third street, Eugene. It develops that there is no such street number at Eugene.

Grief-stricken, the father thinks that his sons are dead, and mourns them as such. He believes that his boys were slain by the real Skikyou bandits, and their effects taken from them to divert suspicion. This was the theory he advanced to the sheriff of Linn county. To Judge Victor Oliver of the same county, he said he feared his sons, surprised by detectives, and knowing the seriousness of the crime which they faced, offered resistance, and were killed.

N. Y. XMAS BOOZE DEATHS TOTAL 7

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Holiday bootleg liquor claimed two more victims today, bringing the list of dead since Christmas day to seven when James Marahan and Edward Churchill, laborers, died.

Six more beds in the alcoholic ward of a hospital were occupied and the sufferers numbered more than fifty, many of them women.

NOSE BLEED SERIOUS, RUSHED TO HOSPITAL

Harold McDonald, well known young Jackson county man and former speed cop who will finish his medical course at the University of Oregon next June, is in the Sacred Heart hospital very weak from nose hemorrhages, with which he was attacked yesterday at the Rogue Elk Resort at Trail where he with his wife had been visiting his parents and attending the McDonald family Christmas reunion since last Saturday.

He was rushed to the city this morning by auto, accompanied by his wife, who under her professional name is Miss Lucille Saunders, one of the best known newspaper women writers of the United States and at present on the staff of The Oregonian at Portland. Mr. McDonald was at once taken to Sacred Heart hospital and placed under the care of Dr. Frederick G. Thayer. While he lost an enormous amount of blood thru the hemorrhages and is in consequence very weak his condition late this afternoon was not regarded as serious so far as could be learned.

2 Sentenced to Death for L. Angeles Murder; 3 Given Life Term

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 27.—Two men were sentenced to death and three others to life imprisonment by Judge Arthur Keech today following their conviction on charges of murder. Of the convicted murderers of Coleman Stone, who was killed during a holdup of his grocery store, Joseph Snelau and Robert Matthews received the death sentence, to be carried out at Folsom prison. Two of their companions in crime, Murphy Williams and Cole Pope, will serve from ten years to life in Folsom. All the men are negroes.

Jose Ybarra, 16, was ordered confined for life in San Quentin prison. He recently was convicted of having killed Grant McCutcheon after robbing him. Judge Keech said Ybarra's youth was all that saved him from the noose.

NICARAGUA IS INVADIED, WAR MAY BE RESULT ONLY 2 LIVES LOST IN QUAKE BUT LOSS HEAVY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—A raid by Honduran soldiers into Nicaraguan territory, resulting in depredations to the property of the Nicaraguan minister of finance, was reported in private advices received today in Washington.

The incident, which followed disturbances during a recent presidential election in Honduras was said to have created a serious situation between the two countries. Details are lacking. Recently a censorship was declared by Honduran authorities, and since then only the most meager advices have been permitted to reach the outside world.

Latest official advices received by the state department from Honduras contain no mention of these reported disorders. American diplomatic representatives, however, have reported recently that the military forces were being employed by the Honduran government in the enforcement of martial law.

Both the Honduran and Nicaraguan legations denied today that they had received any report of a Honduran expedition into Nicaraguan territory.

U. S. PACT HELD UP BY MEXICAN SENATE

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 26.—(Via Laredo Junction, By the Associated Press)—Lack of a quorum prevented the senate from holding its regular meeting today. Opposition senators show a willingness to ratify the special convention recently arranged between the United States and Mexico relative to claims for damages during Mexican revolutions. They refuse, however, ratification of the general convention unless some clauses are amended. Another attempt at holding a regular meeting will be made tomorrow.

Magnus Sees President. WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Senator Magnus Johnson, farmer-laborer, of Minnesota, called on President Coolidge today to recommend the appointment of William Lemke of Fargo, N. D., as ambassador to Mexico. Mr. Lemke is a former attorney general of North Dakota, and was an organizer of the non-partisan league.

FIRPO CAUSES A REGULAR BOXING CRAZE IN BRAZIL

RIO DE JANEIRO—The Brazilian has taken up boxing. Not only has he enjoyed all the great fights of recent times by motion picture and cable report, but now he is learning the game himself. He has donned the four ounce gloves with an enthusiasm never displayed toward any other sport, and it is all because Luiz Angelo Firpo almost an impressive "almost"—took the world championship from Jack Dempsey.

Every section of this city has its athletic club, which is actively promoting the game among its constantly growing membership. Every city, town and village is producing its "champions." Boxing has become the "back lots game" of Brazil, intercity and inter-state tournaments are being carried on with increasing frequency, accompanied by eager public interest.

The youthful imitation of the glazed hair movie hero no longer occupies the center of the stage. It is he with the prominent chest and bulging biceps who attracts the soft glance of the senorita on the Avenida. It is the day of the "rough neck." Let it not be understood, however, that the local ring hero assumes a "tough" pose. He favors Carpentier in that respect. A curious feature of the growing popularity of boxing in Brazil is that while the Brazilian boxers follow the American school in the science and practice of the game, the French are furnishing the language. This is due to the fact that the sporting vocabulary of the American "fans" is a language apart. It cannot be translated, while French is easily understood by the Brazilians. The French sport magazines, therefore, furnish the boxing vocabulary in this country.

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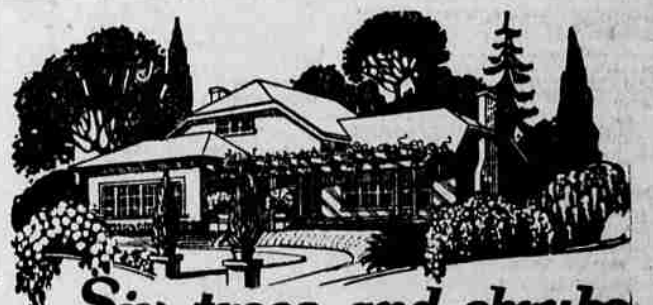
