

PROHIBITION EXPENSES FOR YEAR NOW TOTAL \$10,959

Prohibition enforcement in Jackson county, for the year totals \$10,959.68, according to figures compiled by E. M. Wilson, expert accountant, who is auditing the county books. Of this sum, \$5357.55 was drawn from the general fund, and \$5602.13 from the prohibition enforcement fund. The monthly average is \$913.37.

Classification of the expenditures shows that \$6708 was paid out in salaries, \$2590.40 went for auto expenses, which includes oil, gasoline and mileage, the general expense totaled \$628.48, which includes money spent for liquor, rooms and other activities of sleuthing for the wily bootlegger, current expense of \$55.46, and \$970 to Attorney O. C. Boggs, for services as "special prohibition prosecutor" before he was ousted by Governor Pierce.

The banner month of the year was October, when \$1429.25 was spent, and December, with nine more days to hear from is second with an outlay of \$1083.45, distributed as follows: M. L. Dalley, taxi \$20.00; J. H. Leggett \$199.59; O. C. Boggs \$25.00; William Finley \$8.00; Ray Ingling \$8.00; Sam B. Sandefur \$23.84; V. L. Chappell \$234.72. Mr. Chappell is a son-in-law of Mr. Sandefur.

The former president spent the day much in the manner that he has passed his time in recent months. He continues his program of rest, varied with frequent automobile rides into the country.

The only change from the routine of the day occurred when the former president ordered his automobile for a ride this afternoon. Instead of the car purchased by Mr. Wilson when he left the White House, a new specially designed model of an exclusive make rolled up to the door of the Wilson residence. It was a gift from admirers who declined to reveal their identity.

alarms me most in connection with the organization is the apparent trend of thought inside the ranks of the membership toward disregard for law and order and the tendency of the membership to assume local, state and national political dictatorship and in my judgment when any powerful secret organization assumes either of the above attitudes it immediately becomes a real menace to free government and the rights, privileges and liberties guaranteed under the constitution.

"I have received from widely scattered sections of the country direct and authoritative information that the Klan is rapidly developing nationally as a cheap political machine and in sections where it is strongest, brazenly and openly superseding the authority of the courts through character assassination, intimidation and actual physical violence.

Clark said he was responsible for building up the Klan on the "high ideals" from which it has now fallen, but he would not sit by and accept responsibility for what is being done. He offered to cooperate with the president to force the lawless element out

of the Klan, "thus permitting it to function as a high tone character building fraternal organization, or, this being impossible, toward the stamping out of the menace which the Knights of the K. K. K. has become through the prostitution of its high purposes, ideals and principles."

Hiram W. Evans, present imperial wizard of the Klan, was reported to be in Washington, with some of his aides, preparing to answer Clark's attack.

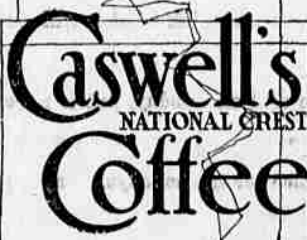
