WASHINGTON U LEADS COAST IN 1923 VICTORIES

SEATTLE, Dec. 28.—(N. Associated Press.) With all of the intercollegiate competition for the present year finished, a retrospect of championship laurels in the various seasons discloses that the University of Washington virtually earned the titles of United States intercollegiate crew champions, Pacific coast golf and tennis champions and northwest football, baseball and track champions.

In addition to these honors the Purple and Gold freshmen crew won its championship in race on the Pacific coast and only lost national honors to Cornell by less than six inches.

Washington athletes took part in sixty collegiate contests during the year, winning 47 and losing 13.

The Husky hoop team played 13 games winning nine and losing four.

NO CHANGES IN FOOTBALL RULES ARE ANTICIPATED

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 28.—No fundamental changes in football rules seem to be required, according to the report of the rules committee made to the convention of the National Collegiate Athletic association today by E. K. Hall of Dartmouth, chairman.

Mr. Hall asserted that in the reports of his committee for the past three years, the opinion has been expressed that no fundamental changes in the rules governing football seemed to be required and that nothing in the experience of last season has tended to alter that opinion.

"On the contrary," Mr. Hall continued, "evidence continues to accumulate that the task the committee undertook some years ago of gradually, through the medium of the rules, changing the game of American rugby football from one that was becoming a closed mass formation and probably too hazardous a game, into an open, running game free from unnecessary hazards, has been practically accomplished."

"The game has been made much safer. Injuries are fewer and less serious and there seems to be no inherent hazard in the game today beyond those which are inevitable in any sport and especially in a sport which includes among its elements speed and physical contact."

"Of the comparatively few instances of serious injuries during the last season, practically all occurred in teams of secondary schools or other teams where the players were competing with very little training and practically no supervision."

Mr. Hall said the committee believed that officiating during the past season was better than ever before.

CAREFUL STUDY OF PADDOCK CASE IS RECOMMENDED

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 28.—General Palmer Pierce, president of the National Collegiate Athletic association reviewed the accomplishments of the past year, outlined the aims of the association and discussed the case of Charlie Paddock, champion sprinter, in his annual address before the convention of the organization in session here today.

He urged strict administration of the amateur law, with particular reference to summer baseball.

One of the controversial matters to be discussed by the association during today's session, he said, will revolve around "the unfortunate incident connected with Mr. Paddock's participation in the University of Paris games last May."

He read considerable correspondence he had had with officials of the Amateur Athletic association which has barred Paddock from competing in this year's Olympic games, and expressed the opinion that there may have been misunderstandings in connection with the case.

He said Paddock had never appealed to the national collegiate athletic association in his case and he understood the A. A. U. had barred Paddock from the coming games at the request of the Olympic executive committee. He asked that the association give serious consideration to the matter.

Outlining the growth of the association General Pierce said the organization is in a flourishing healthy condition and that during 1923 the membership increased ten per cent. The organization started in 1905 with 26 members, he said, and approximately 200 educational institutions are represented at the 18th conference.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 28.—The Multnomah basketball team will play its first game of the season against the University of Oregon here tomorrow night.

High Schools Meet.
PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 28.—When the Oregon State High School State Athletic association opens its annual meeting in Lincoln high auditorium here tomorrow, representatives of every high school in the state will be in attendance and a determined effort will be made by some of these to obtain the passage of amendments to the bylaws and constitution.

Among the rules now in force which

is opposed by some is the prohibition of post season athletic contests.
