MEX. REVOLUTION IS HARD BLOW TO COAST BOOTLEGGER

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 29.—An impasse into which a revolution reported in Mexico has cast the rum traffic, disclosed to the public by a Vancouver newspaper, was a street topic today.

The well established technique of rum running from British Columbia into the United States has been for the carriers to clear for the Mexican ports of Ensenada and Topolobampo, smuggle their cargoes ashore in some quiet spot on the shore of the United States or transfer them to American craft in waters near the international boundary proceed to the Mexican ports, have the papers vised and return here with everything in order.

The revolution has closed the Pacific ports of Mexico to international trade, lament the navigators of the "whiskey" fleet, which is lying by here in Coal Harbor.

FEAR U. S. A. SHIP LOST IN BLACK SEA

LONDON, Dec. 29.—It is feared that the United States shipping board steamer Conelios has foundered inasmuch as ships sent to her assistance report no trace even of her lifeboats. Nothing has been heard of her since the Constantinople agent of the shipping board relayed an S. O. S. message, saying she was sinking.

The shipping board steamer Conelios is scouring the Black sea in the vicinity of Batoum, in the hope of picking up the Conelios' captain and crew, numbering 35.

The Conelios, which registered 3110 tons net was proceeding from Port, north of Batoum for New York with a cargo of manganese ore valued at \$250,000.

SAILSTAD GLAD TO GET IN PRISON

GREEN BAY, Wis., Dec. 29.—Edward J. Sailstad who pleaded guilty to arson in Superior and was sentenced to four years imprisonment, entered the Wisconsin state reformatory for men today after parting from Dorothy Anderson, his "sunshine girl."

Miss Anderson was on the way to Taycheedah to begin a four year sentence at the women's reformatory.
