COLD WAVE IN VALLEY HARD ON PIPES AND FUEL

Along with the New Year came a cold wave and snow fall here and throughout the state, with a minimum in Medford yesterday morning of 15 degrees above, and a minimum today of 13.5. The snow fall of yesterday and last night up to 8 a. m., today, was one-half inch and that of the day before was about the same amount. It was still snowing today off and on, and rain or snow is predicted for tonight and fair and warmer weather for Thursday.

The unexpected cold weather caused water pipes to freeze and burst in many homes Monday night and Tuesday morning and last night and this morning, attended by the discomforts usual on such occasions, and keeping plumbers busy for days to come. The fire fuel consumption in all homes was also greatly increased, and therefore the prediction of warmer weather for tomorrow is most welcome.

The half inch of snow this morning and forenoon caused much skidding of non-chain equipped autos, and falls on the part of pedestrians, as it was of soft consistency, making the pavements slippery and forming compact balls by clinging to soles and heels of shoes.

This forenoon the weather observer at Fish Lake, forty miles northeast of the city, phoned in to C. C. Cate that the minimum temperature there was five degrees below zero. This low temperature in that district causes some apprehension on the part of water works officials because the city water works intake is located but about 10 miles from there. However, no trouble at the intake with freezing temperature, and ice had been reported at the city hall up to noon today.

SEATTLE, Jan. 2.—Anthony Pettinich died today of burns received last night when a can of kerosene that he was using to expedite a new fire in a stove in his home in this city exploded. His daughter, Josephine, six years of age, met instant death when blazing oil ignited her clothing and she breathed the flames. Evelyn, three, another daughter, died in the night from burns. Margaret, five, the remaining daughter, and Mrs. Pettinich, were critically ill today.

RULES GOVERNING PRIZES IN BOAT RACE CHANGED

DETROIT—Revision of the rules governing the International sweepstakes power boat race, designed to obviate the controversy that characterized the first race run here last Labor day, has been adopted by the executive committee of the Yachtmen's Association of America.

The most important changes made in the rules concern the prize money. The \$25,000 prize is abolished, and in its place the committee decided to award an elaborate trophy to the winner and evenly pro-rate \$5000 among all boats finishing in the race.

Detroit, Buffalo, Chicago and Cleveland have entered bids for this year's race.

GUARD CALIFORNIA SCHOOLS FOR FEAR INCENDIARY FIRES

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—School buildings in San Francisco are being guarded to prevent a possible attempt to burn the structures by a supposed arsonist, believed to have been responsible for the destruction of two buildings in Oakland Monday. A similar guard was established for schools at Oakland Monday after the Woodland high school was burned with a loss estimated at \$300,000, the Cole Grammar school was destroyed in a similar manner and a bunch of ill soaked rags found in a room of the Garfield school in East Oakland a few hours later. Police declared evidences of incendiarism were found in the Woodland and Cole school fires.

UNUSUALLY WARM WEATHER PREVAILS SOUTHEAST EUROPE

SOFIA, Bulgaria.—It has rained very little in Bulgaria since last August, and the resultant drought has seriously damaged the autumn sown crops. The low has dropped 30 points in the last month because of the poor agricultural outlook, coupled with repatriation demands. Crop experts predict that unless it rains soon next year's harvest will be a failure.

The water supply of Sofia has been cut down by one-half, and there has been more than one serious fire. The street lights have had to be reduced by two-thirds.

In the middle of November of 1922 children were throwing snowballs in Boris park. Now the park on moonlight nights is filled just as it is in summer evenings with strolling couples. A year ago the slopes and the summit of Mount Vitosha were covered with snow; today they still show signs of verdure.

U. S. FLEET STARTS ON MIMIC WAR IN CARIBBEAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—From points on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, more than 100 ships set out today for the Caribbean to form the greatest armada ever assembled under the American flag in the navy's war maneuvers at Panama, with them going more than 5000 marines from Quantico, Va., and 87 airplanes.

The fleet, which is commanded by Admiral Robert E. Coontz, will comprise, when gathered in the southern waters 15 battleships, four light cruisers, 63 destroyers, 11 submarines, one airplane carrier, one airplane tender, four destroyers, three submarine tenders, five mine layers, two transports and 33 train vessels.

The marines will participate in maneuvers in Panama and on Culebra island, setting their first trout under war conditions in their role of an accompanying landing force with the
