

## BRADSTREET SEES GOOD BUSINESS DURING NEW YEAR

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Bradstreet Review says today:

"Nineteen-twenty-three was a many-sided year—one, in fact, in which the word 'irregular' and its synonyms became outworn from much use. It saw the improvement, first visible in the summer of 1921 and the calendar year 1922, apparently culminate in the record-breaking industrial output of the first five months. Following this came a tapering off of activity and an ebbing of optimism which almost convinced pessimistic prognosticators that they had successfully forecast the future; but following this, in turn, came a fair measure of improvement—successive gains scored in both wholesale and retail trade over the preceding year, a speeding up of the industrial pace in many lines, and a cheerful ending, in a record holiday trade, of an eventful twelve months. All in all, the year resembled nothing so much as a military movement, at first in the form of an advance along an entire front, later checked, and succeeding in turn, came detached advances or retreats, accordingly as resistance developed or the inequalities of the terrain provided obstacles. Individual conditions, in other words, either called for the putting forth of renewed efforts at an advance, the consolidation of positions already won or in a few instances made necessary withdrawals, pending preparations for a new advance. It is probably safe to say that the year was a disappointment alike to the over-optimistic and to the unduly pessimistic, although no doubt, both could adduce abundant proofs from the year's happenings of the essential soundness of their varying predictions.

**Looking Forward.**  
"In considering prospects for the coming year in trade and industry, it is worth recalling that the tone of recent months has been much more cheerful than that, say, in the early summer, or even in midautumn. For this, the failure of many pessimistic predictions in midyear is partly responsible, and it is evident that such a psychology has had, and will have, an important bearing upon the way men will face the uncertainties of the coming year. There is no disposition, however, to ignore the fact that prices, and therefore all costs, including labor, are high, and history may be cited to show that high costs have tended to decline as the distance from the war, which swelled these costs, increases. Hence the disposition will be apparently to go forward cautiously, and to keep near shore as regards buying for the future. In this direction, undoubtedly, safety lies. But, on the other hand, the prospects seem to favor a continuance of the big construction programs, especially in building and railway betterment, for which 1923 was notable. Slight must not be lost of the fact that high labor prices have brought in their train big expenditures which in themselves have constituted a powerful support for general trade and industry. The automobile trade continues one of the wonders of the world, both as regards enormous output and likewise in respect to the immense buying power revealed. Not so much is heard now of location of the saturation point in the buying of these things as of the question as to whether there will be room on the roads to operate those in use, those being built, or those expected to be built in the years to come. As to the fact that the year now opening will see a presidential election with presumably considerable excitement, it is worth observing that research does not altogether confirm the popular idea that a presidential election of and by itself necessarily constitutes a danger to business. There have been some presidential elections when business was very good, and others when it certainly was poor. To instance a few, it may be remarked that 1892, 1900 and 1912 were good years in business, while 1884, 1896, 1904 and 1908 were rather poor specimens. In fact, examination of business history rather reveals other causes as mainly operative in both the good and bad years. Caution and conservatism may be esteemed desirable, but it may be observed that they have both been in evidence for many months past, and no doubt will be found governing most operations in the year to come. It might well be wished that our legislators were inclined to show as much caution as does and will the business community, but perhaps this is too much to ask. The one really comforting reflection the public has, however, is that these gentlemen cannot, after all, do much more than retard business, which has a way of going around obstructions, although the task is sometimes a trying one. At the present writing there does not seem to be much disposition to expect any great change in the fairly even tenor of business as a whole, which throughout the past year ranged from fair to good."

## NEW SPIRIT IN BUSINESS NEEDED TO CONQUER REDS

CINCINNATI, Jan. 2.—Lack of honor among business men is the chief reason for their work not being included in the professions, Dr. Rudolph Rinder, head of the department of sociology, New York university, said today at the meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Business conditions had been aggravated, he said, by war profiteering and subsequent siphoned methods of trade, and the high business honor of the few was not sufficient to leave to raise the whole amount of "dough" acquired by their many co-workers. Schools of commerce were unable to make business a profession because training alone was insufficient, he declared.

"If various forms of radicalism are to be prevented from getting the upper hand," he added, "all business men must acquire a new spirit. Capitalism has achieved wonderful results and in order to preserve itself and civilization, it must add a new achievement, that of genuine service."

## PORTLAND JAP IS FOUND MURDERED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—The body of J. Emoto, a Japanese, 25, was found early today beside a bunkhouse of the Clark and Wilson Lumber company at Linnton, suburb, under conditions which led detectives to believe that he was killed by a blow upon the head with a club and possibly thrown to the ground from a second story window of the bunkhouse.

Detectives were unable to gain any information as to a quarrel in the bunkhouse, however. A workman found Emoto beside the bunkhouse and trying to rouse him by a tap on the shoulder, discovered him dead.

K. Niguma, foreman of the Japanese workmen of the mill, and head of the bunkhouse occupied by Emoto, told detectives he knew of no trouble in the bunkhouse.

## LITTLE MISS LONEY SURVIVED LUSITANIA, BUT NOT GAY HUBBY

NEW YORK—Jurists of Paris, New York and Jacksonville, Florida, are growing slightly dizzy with the domestic troubles of the Robert H. Gambles.

This society pair, well known both here and at Newport, as well as in the Southern resorts, have broken out into one of the most complex and long-continued legal battles ever staged in the courts here.

The latest move on the part of Mrs. Gambles, who was Virginia Bruce Loney, survivor of the Lusitania disaster, is an attempt to have her husband jailed for disposing of \$50,000 worth of Liberty bonds belonging to her without her consent.

Mrs. Gambles sued for divorce in Paris last spring, and in September of this year society was startled to learn that the two Gambles children had disappeared.

Kidnaping was feared and Mrs. Gambles later charged her husband with having stolen their children, when the little tots were found with him in Florida.

Followed in quick succession three suits. In the civil courts, in which Mrs. Gambles demanded \$232,675 from her husband on the ground that he had failed to repay loans of \$150,000, she spent huge sums of her own money in supporting herself and children, and that she had paid many of her husband's personal bills.

Mrs. Gambles inherited most of her mother's estate of \$1,500,000. The mother perished when the Lusitania sank, but Miss Loney, then only 14, swam until she was rescued.

## CONTINUE BUSINESS WHILE BIG BUILDING WAS MOVED 85 FEET

CHICAGO.—A seven-story 7500 ton brick building was moved 85 feet here with its elevator, light and telephone service intact and during which its offices were open to tenants who found it necessary to enter.

The Illinois Central railroad, in its terminal improvements now being made, was presented with the alternative of dismantling the building, or moving it. The structure was erected about 30 years ago but it was in such excellent condition the latter course was taken. The actual moving was accomplished in 24 hours but it required three months' preparation.

## SAYS WORLD WILL ALWAYS HAVE FOOD TO FEED POPULACE

BERKELEY, Cal.—Will the population of the world ever increase to such numbers that the food supply will run out? "No," predicts Professor C. C. Plehn of the department of economics in the University of California.

But the professor qualifies his negative by saying that if the population of the world ever increases as fully as it has the power to, there certainly will be a shortage of food. He explains that, as a matter of statistics, this probably never can happen, since events and conditions always intervene to prevent over-population.

Yet, he concedes, in certain countries this economic over-population has occurred. He cites the annual famines in China and India, which he contends, are due to the fact that the birth rate never has been kept down in those countries and consequently the food supply proves inadequate.

"Dread diseases always follow famine in the train of excessive population and shortage of food," the professor points out, and he states further that as population increases the land is proportionately overworked.

"In America, especially, population has always been held in check. People are made to realize the importance of keeping a balance between the population and the food supply. Farmers manage to produce enough food to satisfy everybody, even though agricultural methods improve more slowly than the population increases. The amount of effort expended in labor and machinery for getting food is increasing steadily, so that, although population tends to increase more rapidly than food, there never will be danger of food giving out."

## PRESIDIO COMMANDER NAMED BRIG. GENERAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Colonel William P. Burnham, commanding at the Presidio, San Francisco, has been appointed brigadier general, filling the vacancy created by the promotion of Major General Gordon last November.

General Burnham is the senior infantry officer of the army and rose from the ranks. During the world war he commanded the 164th infantry brigade and later the 82nd division in France during the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives.

## PREDICTS LABOR GOVERNMENT IN ENGLAND SOON

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Prime Minister Baldwin is expected to return to London from his Christmas holiday in the country today and an early meeting of the cabinet to complete the king's speech for the opening of parliament a week from tomorrow is foreshadowed.

Newspapers whose avowed object is to prevent, if possible, the installation of a socialist government, renew today stories that a considerable section of the liberals is dissatisfied with the attitude of Herbert Asquith and other leaders and is working for an arrangement, amounting to a fusion of the liberals and conservatives to support the Baldwin ministry on some agreed non-party program to keep the socialists out.

The Times professes to be able to correct these reports, saying that Ramsay MacDonald will take over the premiership before the end of January with the full consent of the conservatives and with the assistance of the liberals.

## FREAR IS URGED BY DEMOCRATS TO PROBE WOOD CASE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Representative Frear, republican, Wisconsin, in renewing his demand for a sweeping inquiry into conditions in the Philippines, has taken the position that the scope of such an investigation cannot be determined until ordered by the house or the senate.

Urged by Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, and others, to press forward an inquiry into the business affairs of Leonard Wood, Jr., and the stock market trading activities of Lieutenant Osborne Wood as well as the administration of their father, Governor General Wood, in the Philippines, Mr. Frear has declined to amend his resolution calling for an investigation which has been referred to the rules committee.

Mr. Frear declared yesterday, however, that a "probe" should be made into some of the reputed Aladdin Lamp Oil transactions of Osborne Wood, that finally called for action by the secretary of war and the president of the United States, and Senator Caraway said he intended to turn over to the representative some correspondence he has received on the activities of Leonard Wood, Jr.

It is estimated that the railroads of the United States spent approximately \$3,100,000,000 for equipment in 1923. Forward buying thus far indicates another huge outlay next year.

Importation of large quantities of cheap copper from Africa and South America unsettled the domestic copper market, despite the fact that consumption was greater than ever before, and in excess of domestic production. The sharp diminution in export demand, due to the unsettled economic conditions abroad, sent the price of the red metal down to where but few companies could operate at a satisfactory profit. One of the outstanding developments in the industry was the purchase of the Chile Copper company and the American Brass company by the Anaconda Copper company.

Fear of a sugar shortage in midsummer, which led to a temporary era of heavy speculation in sugar futures, proved to be unfounded. Sugar producing companies succeeded in recouping some of the heavy post-war losses, dividends being resumed in a few cases.

Cotton prices reached the highest levels in more than three years on a shortage in the crop, due primarily to the ravages of the boll weevil. Unseasonable weather and a heavy demand for the raw product were other contributory causes to the higher prices.

Relatively low wheat prices, due to a reduction in export demand, overproduction and increased competition by Canadian growers, led to suggestions of reduced freight rates on grain for export by President Coolidge and prominent western legislators. Other farm products showed material increases in value, particularly corn.

Mail order houses and chain stores did a record breaking business. However, the leather, rubber, chemical, shipping and motion picture industries had periods of depression from which they had not fully recovered at the end of the year.

Considerable interest was aroused in financial and business circles in the closing weeks of the year by Secretary Mellon's recommendations for a reduction in income taxes, which was endorsed by President Coolidge in his first message to congress. The belief was widely held that the reductions proposed would do much to stimulate business activity in the coming year.

## \$500,000 IN BOGUS TEN DOLLAR BILLS IN CIRCULATION

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—Counterfeit 10 federal reserve notes of a face value of more than \$500,000 are being circulated between the Atlantic coast and Rocky mountains, according to federal secret service men who recently unearthed 900 of the bogus bills in an underground cache near here.

Five persons, including a woman have been arrested in St. Louis, Chicago and St. Paul and government operatives are searching in every middle western city for the source of the money. The bills are silk threaded, bear a portrait of Andrew Jackson, are marked Series 7-G with the number D-333 under the seal, and also slightly off color on the reverse side, are said to be hard to detect.

The buried bills were found by detectives after their location was told by Homer Sweeney, arrested with his wife, Mae Sweeney, after they had attempted to circulate some of the bills in
