REPORT PROGRESS IN LOCAL CHAPTER OF SCOUT COUNCIL

The local council of Medford Boy Scouts met in their regular session today at luncheon at the Hotel Medford. The report of activities and developments revealed a healthy progress being made in the movement. The troops are showing up in good shape in their training. Much necessary equipment has arrived and is being utilized.

At the request of the Scout commissioner, the Jackson County Medical society at their recent session, offered their services for the physical examination of each boy as he qualified in the tenderfoot tests. There are a number of benefits to be derived from this examination.

The encampment committee displayed a drawing of the encampment plans. The entire council of twenty-one will spend a day at the camp site early in the spring and be able thereby to definitely set their plans in motion.

Scout Commissioner Coan asked the council to authorize the civic work committee to take the responsibility in the restoration of the only remaining original Jackson creek miner's log cabin. The council did so, and instructed Mr. Coan to communicate with the Oregon Historical society and others relative to the matter.

A hundred and fifty dollars was assigned to further equip the Scout library and purchase the necessary boys' periodicals for the year.

The local Golden Rule store will be made the local agent for Scout uniform equipment and the orders for a supply of these will be at headquarters by the time the annual charter is granted.

Scores of scouts are now qualified and entitled to wear the uniform and to other scout privileges.

PLUMBERS STRIKE SALEM SETTLED, THEN CALLED AGAIN

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—The strike of local journeymen plumbers for a wage increase of \$1 per day is on again today after having been apparently settled. Last night the secretary of the Master Plumbers' association notified the journeymen that the master plumbers would agree to arbitration by a local board if the plumbers would return to work pending a settlement at the present wage scale, any increase allowed by the arbitrators to be retroactive to January 1. On that basis the journeymen returned to their jobs this morning.

At a special meeting of the master plumbers this morning it was decided that the secretary had exceeded his authority in making the settlement offer and refused to ratify the tentative agreement. The journeymen immediately laid down their tools.

PLUMBING FEE SCALE ADOPTED BY CITY COUNCIL

At its first session of the new year the city council last night passed new plumbing and electrical ordinances, or rather amended the old ordinances relating to them so as to provide a license and inspection fee for the installation of all plumbing and electrical lighting and other power devices in the city, which was not provided for in the old ordinance.

The change was made in order to improve sanitary and health conditions and decrease the fire hazard in the city, and had been discussed for months previously by the mayor and councilmen. It is estimated that the fees taken in for both plumbing and electrical installation will amount to \$2000 or over a year—ample to provide for proper inspection by the city, and pay for same, which will probably be in the hands of one man to be chosen later.

Under the new ordinance the license fee charged each electrical contractor will be \$50 for the first year and \$25 annually thereafter. The fee for electrical inspection is 10 cents for the first five lights installed, five cents each for each additional light, and other wiring construction higher but in proportion.

The plumbing fees will be as follows: Fifty dollars for each plumber the first year and \$25 annually thereafter, for each fixture installed twenty-five cents up to and including five; 15 cents for all fixtures above five installed, and ten cents for each additional one after that.

The fees outside of those charged the plumbers and electrical contractors will all be charged to the home or place of business having the work installed.

The council also disposed of much routine business last night. The contract providing for the leasing of the city auto camp to the Merrick Motor Inn, is not yet ready in all its details, and hence the ordinance completing this deal went over to the next council meeting.
