

EX-SERVICE MEN FORM LEAGUE TO FIGHT THE BONUS

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—With every state in the union except Arizona and Nevada represented in its membership, the Ex-Service Men's Anti-Bonus league now has active state organizations in California, Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Virginia.

These were the high lights in a progress report made to the league's executive committee by its national president, Knowlton Durham. The league, said Mr. Durham, will not interfere with the league's membership campaign. While congress is in recess the league will be organizing. "With the league's activities expanding," continues Mr. Durham, "we are developing a constantly increasing support among American Legion Posts, and American Legion members who have hitherto had no effective agency through which to make protest against the bonus scheme."

"In Chicago, World War veterans formed a unit of the Anti-Bonus league at a meeting attended by Mayor Denver and other prominent figures representing Chicago's business, professional and industrial leadership. The Chicago Tribune, in a recent editorial, supports the league's position."

"In Macon, Georgia, complete anti-bonus league organization has been effected, headed by a legion commander and by the legion's state chaplain. The Denver organizer reports that a legion post there has gone on record against the bonus and is organizing a unit of the league. Similar action has been taken by posts in Cleveland and by twelve posts in Greater New York. Charters have been forwarded during the last few days to league units in Denver, Colorado; Flint, Michigan; Richmond, Virginia; St. Louis, Missouri; Dayton, Ohio; Indianapolis and South Bend, Indiana; Pittsburg, Scranton, Norristown and Allentown, Pennsylvania; Lexington, Massachusetts; Hartford and New Britain, Connecticut; Nashville, Tennessee; Atlanta, Georgia; Warren, Ohio and New Orleans."

"New York City, Philadelphia, Detroit, Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Denver and San Francisco are centers from which organization is radiating."

"In a recent letter to the league," continues Mr. Durham, "Luther Faulkner, of Boston, expresses a sentiment that has struck a responsive cord with ex-service men in every state of the union. Faulkner said: 'Paid in full is a statement that can never be written across the face of an honorable discharge.'"

"The Ex-Service Men's Anti-Bonus league holds that every man owes a debt to his country that cannot be capitalized on a wage basis. The country likewise owes a debt to its defenders that cannot be effaced on the basis of adjusted compensation. This mutual obligation is the bond that binds the nation and the individual."

CANNERS VOTE TO COOK VEGETABLES IN PRESSURE TANKS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3.—Demonstrations incident to berry canning occupied the attention this morning of delegates to the tenth annual convention of the Northwest Cannery association here.

This afternoon there are to be addresses by Dr. E. F. Kohlman of Washington, chemist of the National Cannery association; W. G. Allen of Salem, and R. C. Paulus of Salem, manager of the Oregon Co-operative Growers association.

Following an address by J. O. Holt, president of the Eugene Fruit Growers association, on standardization and sterilizing the delegates voted to cook all vegetables hereafter in pressure tanks, to make sure that all botulism bacteria in the vegetables are destroyed.

TARIFF PROFITS IN CHINA DROP

PEKING, Jan. 3.—(By Associated Press). Although the increases in customs duties arranged at the time of the armament conference in Washington, to the end that China might receive as revenue five per cent of the value of her imports, were in effect through 1923, the results are disappointing. The maritime revenue for last year showed an increase of only 4,744,000 taels (about \$3,500,000) over the previous record collection in 1922, according to the report of the inspector general.

Native customs collected at treaty ports, where their collection is supervised by the inspector general of maritime customs, Sir P. A. Aglen, head of the administration which exercises foreign control over the maritime customs to insure payment of the foreign debt showed an increase last year of 162,000 taels.

In China's loan and indemnity obligations due from these revenues now, have been included the recent organization loan but a default occurred in payment of interest on a portion of the domestic consolidated debt.

IRISH FREEDOM CASH DISAPPEARS

DUBLIN, Jan. 3.—Attorney Finnelly, who is here on behalf of the American council of Irish Republicans to examine Eamonn DeValera, Austin Stack and Robert Barton in connection with the disputed claim to 500,000 pounds in Irish funds which are the subject of litigation in the United States, has applied to the Free State government for release of DeValera and Stack or for permission to visit them in prison. So far he has received no reply. Barton, who was recently set free, can be interrogated.

There is some speculation here as to whether the others will be released on parole or examined in jail.

Ambassador Geddes to Visit Friends in U. S.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Sir Auckland Geddes, retiring British ambassador to the United States, left London yesterday for America for a month of leave-taking before his resignation becomes effective.

Replying to inquiries about his health, Sir Auckland said he felt better than for years, and that it seemed almost absurd to think of resigning his Washington post on account of ill health. Nevertheless, his doctors had insisted that unless he had another six months rest all they had achieved for his eyes might be undone.

New Light for Flying.
MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., Jan. 3.—A new light, termed by Major W. N. Hensley, Jr., commander of the army aviation station the greatest single achievement in furtherance of night flying was demonstrated.

ITALIAN CHAMP TO MEET FIRPO FEBRUARY 24TH

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 3.—Sporting circles believe that much of the mystery which has thus far enveloped the Spalla-Firpo negotiations may be due to the apparent competition between New York and Buenos Aires promoters to match Spalla.

Firpo yesterday announced that the bout would be held in this city on February 24 and would be scheduled to go fifteen rounds, with Firpo receiving forty per cent of the gate. Senior Lankman, who is promoting the match, announces that five prominent French boxers sailed from Marseilles for Buenos Aires last week, to be matched with Argentines, and predicted that Buenos Aires would become a world boxing center.

MILAN, Italy, Jan. 3.—Erminio Spalla, European heavyweight champion, is training at Marseilles, France, while awaiting a definite date for his match with Luis Angel Firpo in Buenos Aires.

(A dispatch from Buenos Aires last night said that the Firpo-Spalla fight would be held on the football field of that city on February 24. Spalla's brother, Giuseppe, says that after the bout with Firpo, Erminio will probably go to New York, where negotiations are proceeding for matches with Gene Tunney, American light-heavyweight champion, and Tom Gibbons.

Spalla has signed to meet Georges Carpentier in Milan next June and in May again will box the Dutch heavyweight Vandervort, from whom he won the title. This bout will take place in Rome.

It is expected that Spalla will sail for Buenos Aires about January 10.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Former Secretary Fall of the interior department has notified the senate public lands committee that although he has been ordered by his physicians to go to Florida to recuperate from illness, he will return here at any time the committee may direct in connection with its Teapot Dome investigation. The notification was sent to Chairman Lenroot before Mr. Fall left Washington for the south.

LEONARD WOOD, JR. ALSO MIXED UP IN OIL PROMOTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Counsel for Leonard Wood, Jr., announced today that their client was ready to render any assistance possible to those members of congress who have sought an inquiry into his oil stock transactions.

Recently Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, and others have asked that Mr. Wood's financial ventures be inquired into along with those of his brother, Lieutenant Osborne Wood. They have urged Representative Frear, republican, Wisconsin, to broaden his pending Philippine resolution so as to include an investigation of the finances of both of the sons of Governor General Leonard Wood, but so far Mr. Frear has declined to do so.

Leonard Wood, Jr., is head of the Acme Production corporation, one of the many oil companies which have come under investigation by the post office department in its general inquiry into the oil stock situation. The inquiry has been in progress for several months but so far no action has been considered feasible.

REPORT CALIFORNIA FROST LOSS SMALL

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3.—The southern California freeze shifted its clutch to the Imperial valley last night with Calexico reporting a minimum of 27 degrees above zero.

Los Angeles officially recorded 41 downtown while it was from five to ten degrees lower in outlying districts. At California Fruit Growers Exchange headquarters it was announced that it was impossible at this time to make an accurate estimate of crop loss for some weeks. Exchange officials believed the loss was small.

ANOTHER BEAUTIFUL SHRINE UNCOVERED

LUXOR, Egypt, Jan. 3.—(By the Associated Press).—When the doors of the second shrine in Tutankhamun's tomb were opened this morning, a third brilliantly colored and gilded shrine was disclosed. This shrine, which was also opened by the excavators is inscribed with hieroglyphs and on the doors are depicted the figures of a horse-headed man and the cow-headed Hathor, Egyptian goddess of love.

RACINE, Wis., Jan. 3.—(By Associated Press). Fifty years of editorial direction of the Racine Journal-News, one of Wisconsin's leading newspapers were rounded out today by F. W. Starbuck, veteran president of the Journal Printing company. Although for eleven years Mr. Starbuck has lived in California, deprived of his eyesight, he has continued actively to direct the policy of his paper, writing many of its editorials and keeping in touch with its development. In the meantime, his son, F. R. Starbuck, secretary and treasurer of the company has managed the publication.

Mrs. Sanderson is a well known writer.

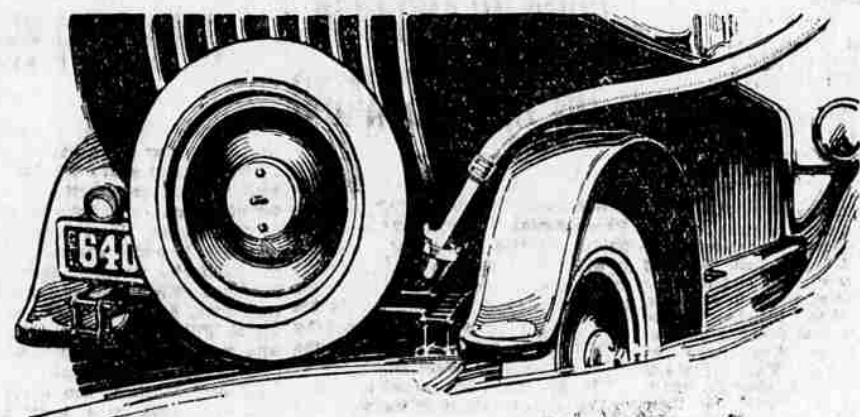
