COUNTY TO MOVE GRAVEL MACHINE FROM SANDEFERS

The gravel equipment which has been operating at the fair grounds, on ex-D. M. Lowe farm, has been dismantled for the season, and will next be set up, when winter departs, in the Table Rock district, to gravel the roads in that district. The plant has been operating on its present location for the last five or six months, and the ground is under the control of County Prohibition Enforcement Officer Sam B. Sandefers. The December bill for gravel was paid with a warrant to V. L. Chappell, his son-in-law, for 2509 yards of gravel, at ten cents per yard, the amount being \$250.90.

The total amount spent by Jackson county since July 30, 1923, is \$1510 for gravel from the Sandefers tract. The various shifting in ownership of the tract of land from which the gravel is procured, is told in the volumes of the county recorder's office, which stripped of its legal verbiage, is as follows:

The land was purchased by Jackson county for a fairground site from V. E. (Slim) Warren of Hill and Yreka, Calif., for \$20,000. Of this amount \$5000 was paid by popular subscription. The county paid \$2000 and agreed to pay \$2000 per year, until paid, the warranty deed to same being held in escrow in the Medford National bank, until paid for.

On May 6, 1921, according to the records, Jackson county issued a "contract of sale" to D. M. Lowe, for 49.86 acres, at \$100 per acre, plus \$100, making the total purchase price \$5086.

Mr. Lowe paid \$200 down and agreed to pay \$100 per month, beginning June 1, 1921, until one-half was paid. The remaining half was to be paid for in two payments, the first in one-half year from date of the last payment, and the second half in two years. Mr. Lowe paid in \$3200 leaving a balance of \$1886.

On February 19, 1923, D. M. Lowe entered into a dicker to sell the 49.86 acres for \$5500 to Alta M. Sandefers et al, the et al being County Prohibition Officer S. B. Sandefers and his son-in-law, Victor L. Chappell, and Mr. Lowe transferred his "contract of sale" to the above named parties, under the following terms, as shown by the official records.

One hundred dollars down and \$100 per month, from March 1st, 1923, to August 1st, 1923. On the last named date it was agreed to make an additional payment, sufficient to bring the total paid in up to \$1000.

On August 1, 1924, there is to be a payment of \$500, on August 1, 1925, a payment of \$500, and on August 1, 1926, a payment of \$750.

Upon this date, one-half the total price of \$5500 will have been paid in, and Mr. Lowe agrees to give a warranty deed, and take a mortgage for the balance in the shape of a promissory note, payable as follows:

On August 1, 1927, a payment of \$500, the same amount on August 1, 1928, the same amount on August 1, 1929, the same amount on August 1, 1930, and \$750 on August 1, 1931—the date of the final payment.

The present occupants of the land agree to keep up the buildings, insurance, and taxes, and, in the event of failure to comply with any of the terms, "the sale of contract" automatically reverts to D. M. Lowe.

START A WORLD
WIDE SEARCH FOR
TACOMA CHILDREN

TACOMA, Jan. 3.—With foreign consuls of the United States being called up to assist, an international search has been launched to locate Francis Lee Hill, 12, and James Preston Hill, 8, children of L. P. Hill, a lumberman here, and to apprehend Mr. and Mrs. Earl A. Stanton, against whom warrants are held here for kidnapping the children.

Mr. Hill has been promised the aid of the state department in the search which is directed especially toward Mexico.

HIGH TRIBUTE IS PAID TO VICTIM OF THEATRE FIRE

The funeral services held yesterday afternoon of Amos R. Willis, who met such a tragic instant death last Sunday by a falling wall at the Page theatre fire, were unusual in their very large attendance and pathos. The Perle Funeral Home chapel and lobby were filled with sympathetic friends and acquaintances of the family, and many persons stood outside.

The members of Talisman lodge, Knights of Pythias, and of Fuhat Burkhan temple, D. O. K. K. and the members of the volunteer fire department of which Mr. Willis was a member, attended in a body, as did also Mayor E. C. Gaddis and the members of the city council, and Acting Chief Taylor Burch also attended as the representative of the regular fire department.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful, including exceptionally fine pieces from the city administration, members of the regular fire department, Talisman lodge, Fuhat Burkhan temple, and the George A. Hunt Theater company.

The active pallbearers were members of D. O. K. K. Brigades of which the deceased was leader: Mr. Yarbrough, George Fish, Walter Smith, Walter Erskine, Roland Smith and Carl Peterson. Honorary pallbearers, W. N. Offutt, Jr., Floyd Wilson, G. T. Conrad, Victor Danielson, J. C. Lattrell and George Gates of the volunteer fire department.

The services were in charge of Rev. J. Randolph Sannett, pastor of the First Methodist church, who delivered an eloquent eulogy in memory of the departed man, while Hesperian lodge had charge of the Knight of Pythias ritualistic service both at the chapel and the grave.

Interposed in the services were songs by the D. O. K. K. male quartet, consisting of Harry Scougall, George Madden, Everett Brayton and John Kirkpatrick, who sang, "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," and "Somewhere, Sometime."

As the funeral cortege departed from the chapel for the cemetery at Ashland, a quartet of the D. O. K. K. band consisting of two cornets, baritone and trombone played the exceptionally beautiful and inspiring improvised selection from "Gottschalk's Last Hope."

The D. O. K. K. band led the big procession, followed by the Knights of Pythias lodge, D. O. K. K. temple and the volunteer firemen, as an escort, playing the dirges, "Chopin's Funeral March," and "Flee as a Bird" enroute to Riverside avenue. At this point the procession proper distinguished and the hearse and mourners, and many others continued on to Ashland where the further services and interment took place in Mountain View cemetery.

With the grief-stricken widow and baby son among the mourners were George T. Wrisley of Lentz, Ore., youngest son of John B. Wrisley, who was an Oregon pioneer of 1852; J. Q. Willis, of Cottage Grove, another uncle; Leland Willis of Klamath Falls, a cousin of the deceased; and Louis A. French, brother of Mrs. Willis, who arrived here from Grand Forks, N. D., last Wednesday, and will remain for several days yet. Mr. French has been an engineer on the Great Northern railroad for the last 22 years.

The widow and the young child of Amos R. Willis will fare quite well in the matter of insurance, as it is understood that in addition to a policy of \$4000 and an accident policy of \$1000 carried by Mr. Willis they come in for quite a lift under the state compensation act, as the city has all its employees, except mayor, city attorney, treasurer and recorder insured under this act, including members of the volunteer fire department.

Under this act, in accordance with premiums paid by the city, \$30 a month is allowed the widow for the length of her life, or unless she should marry again, and \$8 a month is paid towards the child's support until he is 16 years old.

Or in lieu of this method of compensation over a long course of years Mrs. Willis has the option of taking a lump sum at once instead of between \$9000 and \$10,000 estimated that would be paid out to her by the above monthly payments during her normal life, but such lump sum would be materially discounted from the above estimated amount.

3000 DOGS HERE BUT ONLY TWO LICENSES TAKEN

Licenses—fishing, hunting and dog, are now due, and can be procured at the county clerk's office, for the year.

The first hunting and fishing license of the present year has been issued to Ben Peart of Eagle Point. Mr. Peart has been the first to purchase among the nimrods and anglers, for the last ten years.

The dog licenses were due before January 1st, but up to the present time but two canine owners in Jackson county have come to the front. Unless dog owners buy licenses, the county has the power to order licenseless dogs executed. The fee is \$1 for males, and \$2 for females. In 1923 the dog population was estimated at 3000, and it is thought there has been an increase. City dogs and country dogs alike are subject to the license law.

Last year, the dog owners were dilatory about complying with the law, and the sheriff was ordered to start slaying. This resulted in the famous ultimatum by Sheriff Terrill, "that I'll blow my own brains out before I'll kill any dog, for anybody, no matter how no-account they are."
