LONDON, Jan. 7.—(By Associated Press). The M. P.'s of the country are flocking to London today preparatory to the reassembly of the house of commons tomorrow.

Among the arrivals are the members of Glasgow's labor contingent, popularly regarded as "The wild men" of the labor movement, who were accorded an enthusiastic sendoff in Glasgow. Baillie Doolan, chairman of the group, told the crowd that the new labor members were not going to London with the idea of becoming cabinet ministers, but were rather taking their seats in parliament as missionaries of socialism.

SENATE CONTINUES SPEAKER DEADLOCK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—On two more ballots today the senate failed to break its deadlock over the chairmanship of the inter-state commerce committee and adjournment was taken until tomorrow. The first ballot showed: Smith, democrat, South Carolina, 32; Cummins, republican, Iowa, 24; Couzens, republican, Michigan, 12; and Fess, republican, Ohio, 1. Smith thus was four short of the necessary majority.

A second ballot, the 29th since the deadlock began, also was without result. Smith had 34 votes, Cummins 30, Couzens 12 and Fess 1.

LEWIS STAGE IS FORCED IN DITCH

Passengers on the northbound Ashland-Portland stage were delayed about 30 minutes this morning owing to the stage taking the ditch to avoid striking another car driven by A. B. Shelby of Ashland in front of it from a side road about two miles north of Medford, according to officials of the Lewis stage line.

The stage suffered practically no damage and the car being only slightly dented. Another stage was summoned from Medford and the passengers taken on their journey. The stage was driven back on the pavement after a plank road was laid through a strawberry bed.

PORTLAND COLD SPELL BROKEN, RAIN BEGINS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7.—Sleet falling at daybreak here today turned later into rain, reducing a snow mantle of about two inches to slush. Warmer weather throughout the state was forecast, with gales along the coast. Portland this morning emerged from sub-freezing temperature which has gripped the city since early last week.

SEATTLE, Jan. 7.—Two deaths in traffic accidents were reported by the police here today. William Jones, 17, was instantly killed when the motorcycle he was riding crashed into a delivery truck. Benjamin Tickner, aged 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Tickner was run down by an automobile stage, receiving injuries from which he died late tonight.

BOBBY BYLAND TO BE IN CONDITION FOR GUS SCHNEIDAU

Bobby Byland, Minneapolis light-heavyweight grappler who is slated to meet Gus Schneidau at the Armory tomorrow night, frankly says that he is one of the best light-heavyweights in the United States. His match with Tod Thye at Portland Saturday night doesn't tell anything. Byland was knocked unconscious by Thye in a similar fashion to Schneidau's unlucky fall to Mike Yokel here at the last wrestling smoker. That the Minneapolis boy is a formidable opponent for Gus is evident.

Where two evenly matched men like Gus Schneidau and Bobby Byland say that they are "out for blood" figuratively speaking, fans may anticipate a real scrap. The referee tomorrow night will be Henry Burk, who arrived in Medford this morning from Klamath Falls.

Burk is a big, husky boy with all the ear marks of a wrestler. He is far from being friendly with Gus Schneidau and claims that local promoters are discriminating against him when they refuse to match him with Schneidau. When The Mail Tribune sport writer confronted Schneidau with Burk's claims of two victories over the local boy at Klamath Falls, Gus admitted that Burk threw him on two occasions, but that he was in poor condition then.

There will be a demand for a Burk-Schneidau match by local fans and Gus will be called upon to prove his contention that he's a better man than Burk. This match will be arranged after tomorrow night's Byland smoker if Schneidau will agree to it.

indefinitely in giving examples of their work and intention in regard to other countries, the speaker said he would content himself with a few examples, first as to their general intentions and activities in countries other than the United States and second, with a few examples of their intentions and activities in the United States.

Letter from Trotsky As an example of the latter, he read from a letter written by Trotsky, "to an American communist," Mackay, a negro, which was published in the Moscow Izvestia, on February 15, 1923. It said in part:

"The training of black agitators is the most important revolutionary problem of the moment. . . . I am at a loss to say what are the most expedient organization forms for the movement among the American negroes, because I am not familiar with the concrete conditions and possibilities, but the organization form will be found as soon as sufficient will for action is displayed."

Senator Lodge presented also a pamphlet prepared by the United Mine Workers of America which he said gave a very full account of the activities of the Russian communist party and the third internationale in undertaking to gain control of American labor organizations. He said also that it showed a large expenditure of

money in this country by the communists. Gompers is Quoted As a further demonstration of the feeling of American labor unions in regard to the communist movement the speaker read from the letter of last December 13, written by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor in which Mr. Gompers made clear his belief that any compromise with the soviets would be a victory for them.

Another document presented by Senator Lodge was a letter written under date of July 12, 1923, to the workers' party of America, by the executive committee of the communist internationale. It urged greater activity among communists in America in organizing the workers and combatting "capitalist designs."

"This letter has great importance," said Senator Lodge, for it demonstrates at this very moment the close connection between the communist internationale and the workers' party of America. The communist internationale as has been shown, is dominated by the Russian communist party and the party dominates and controls the so-called Russian govt. republic and the whole Russian government. In other words, the communist propaganda in America comes directly from the government we are asked to recognize."
