

### GERMAN MONEY IN FOREIGN BANKS IS NOT VITAL FACTOR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—The amount of German money in foreign banks in addition to the credit balances necessary to keep German industry alive is not sufficient to affect French reparation demands, Frau Adele Schreiber, member of the Reichstag, who was given the privilege of the senate floor yesterday, declared today at a luncheon forum of the National Popular Government League.

### COLD WAVE FATAL TO 20 IN SOUTH

ATLANTA, Jan. 8.—With fair weather predicted for today and the assurance of warmer weather, the south welcomed the end of a cold wave that took a total of nearly twenty deaths from exposure to cold and fire mishaps in this section. The peninsula citrus crop was threatened at several points, growers reported, but escaped with little or no damage.

### NEW JAP CABINET TO BORROW FOREIGN MONEY

TOKIO, Jan. 8.—(By the Associated Press)—The new Japanese cabinet, completed early this week, will adopt budget estimates for the coming fiscal year as made by the ministry of former Premier Yamamoto, which resigned following the attempted assassination of Prince Regent Hirohito, according to an interview given out by Kazushoda, minister of finance, and published in the newspapers here.
