C., Jan. 8 .- Th amount of German money in foreign banks in addition to the credit balances necessary to keep German in dustry alive is not sufficient to affect French reparation demands, Frau Adele Schreiber, member of the reichstag, who was given the privilege of the senate floor yesterday, declared today at a luncheon forum of the Na-

tional Popular Government league.

She expressed the conviction that Germany could not pay enough within the next two years "to make any difference in reparations, if we are to live, be able to work and carry on our industries," since the "only source from which we can obtain money to pay reparations is from profits on our exports."

Press)—The new Japanese cabinet, completed early this week, will adopt budget estimates for the coming fiscal year as made by the ministry of former Premier Yamamoto, which resigned following the attempted assarsination of Prince Regent Hirohito, according to an interview given out by Kazueshoda, minister of finance, and published in the newspapers here. The new cabinet, however, intends to resort to foreign loans quite freely when capital is required for useful, productive undertakings, for which the estimates of the previous ministry falled to make provision, it was said.

In a carefully prepared address Senator Lodge declared there were interlocking directorates," between the soviet government, the communist party and the internationale with designs inimical to the American form of government. of government.

Senator Borah replied that the time had come to negotiate with the Russian government to determine whether recognition prefequisites laid down by President Coolidge in his opening ad-

dress could be met.

The Idaho senator said he was "in perfect necord" with President Coolidges' statement on the question, requiring settlement of American claims, adjustment of the Russian republic debt and cessation of commu-nist propaganda in this country, a-conditions precedent to Russian recog

nition.

These "fundamental principles."
Senator Borah sald, were universally recognized as desirable.
Recognition of Russia, he declared. "would tend to bring about better conditions throughout the world."
Senator Brookhart, republican, of Iowa, asked what was the present status of Russe-American relations.

"Apparently one of war upon the part of the United States," repiled Mr.

"Apparently one of war upon the part of the United States," replied Mr. Borah.

Declaring the present government of Russia had endured for six years "despite four invasions, munitioned and provisioned by foreign governments." Senator Borah asked, "what would take its place if Mr. Hughes' declaration consolidates sufficient moral influence in other nations to overthrow it?"

"None can expect anything but chaos and misery, unlimited and indescribable," he said.


