WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Representative Hill, republican of Maryland, replying today to the plea for dry enforcement made last week by Representative Upshaw, democrat, Georgia, charged that violations of the Volstead in the latter's state were flagrant and continuous. "Mr. Upshaw and his fellow Anti-Saloon leaguers," Representative Hill declared, "cannot enlist public sentiment in Georgia to enforce the act."
