VOTES FOR WOMEN UP IN FRANCE ONCE MORE

PARIS, Jan. 8.—(By the Associated Press)—The parliamentary session opening today will be closed by the advent of another chamber, for the mandates of the deputies sitting in this legislature expire on May 31, while the next, which is to be elected in May, is to be inaugurated on June 1.

Bills awaiting the attention of the legislature include the enactment of the budget, re-organization of the army, ratification of the Lausanne treaty and a mass of social legislation among which is a measure for enfranchising women.

In addition, the chamber will finish the debate on the foreign policy and take up the interpellations on the home policy.

JOHNNY CARLSON TO BOX AT BYLAND MATCH TONIGHT

Bobby Byland, well known Minneapolis wrestling exponent, is expected to arrive here this afternoon for his match with Gus Schneidau at the armory this evening. Byland and Schneidau are well matched as far as weight and size go and each one is anxious to win tonight. Henry Hurk, who is a well known wrestler himself, will referee this evening's go, which assures a good, square main event. Burk has issued a challenge against Schneidau for a future match here and seems to be confident that he can win from the local boy. He claims two victories over Gus at Klamath Falls.

The entire program will be staged on the center, elevated ring used for the bouts at the legion's New Year's day smoker. Tonight's affair will begin at 8:30 o'clock.

ROSEBURG MAN IS MADE FAIR HEAD

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7.—A. C. Marsters of Roseburg was this afternoon elected president of the state fair board to succeed J. E. Reynolds of La Grande at a meeting of the board here. Other officers named were F. E. Lynn of Perrydale, vice-president; A. N. Bush, Salem, treasurer; F. B. Currey of La Grande, secretary. Department heads are also to be elected this afternoon.

FORBIDDEN CITY MAY BE TOMB OF NASHVILLE M. D

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 8.—The eastern border of Tibet, "the roof of the world," may be the burial place of the second Nashville physician to give his life in the effort to bring Christianity and modern science to the forbidden land. The city of Batang, in western Szechuan, China, is taken by the Tibetan bandits who surround it, according to press dispatches. It is believed the bandits hold as prisoners Dr. William Hardy, representative of the Vine street Christian church, of this city, his wife, and three children. Dr. W. H. Duncan and wife, also of the Foreign Christian Mission society, and J. P. Morse and wife of the United Charities commission.

Dr. Hardy is the successor of Dr. Loftis as representative of the Vine street church. He volunteered to go into the dangerous mission station as soon as news reached Nashville of the death from plague of Dr. Loftis several years ago.

Dr. Loftis' death was followed in 1922 by the death of Dr. Albert Leroy Shelton, several miles from Batang, on February 17, at the hands of a band of robbers. Dr. Shelton was buried beside Dr. Loftis.

VETERANS SPANISH WAR IN SALEM OPPOSE PARDON

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8.—The local camp of Spanish War Veterans last night adopted a resolution protesting

against a petition now in circulation to procure from the government a pardon for Mrs. Alma Louise Wurtzbarger, who killed her husband at Chemawa, Ore., about three years ago. The action of the veterans is on the grounds that Wurtzbarger was a Spanish war veteran and that there is evidence indicating that the murder was in cold blood. Mrs. Wurtzbarger is a federal prisoner for the reason that the crime was committed at their home on the premises of the Chemawa Indian school. She is held at the Oregon prison for the reason that her health would not permit her to be taken to a federal prison. The local post will ask the state department to request all other local posts in the state to take similar action.

TACOMA SCHOOL IS ROBBED BY YEGGS

TACOMA, Jan. 7.—A band of yeggsman early this morning overpowered the watchman at the Lincoln high school here, knocked off the combination of the school vault, took \$500 in

cash and imprisoned the watchman in the vault. The watchman was released five hours later by a school janitor. After robbing the school, the bandits came to the business section here and were attempting to enter the American Express office when they were seen by police. The bandits fled toward Seattle in an automobile. Seattle officers were notified, and met the bandits' car when it approached that city. Police here were notified that the bandits escaped after a running fight with Seattle police, abandoning their car, which was stolen in Seattle last evening.

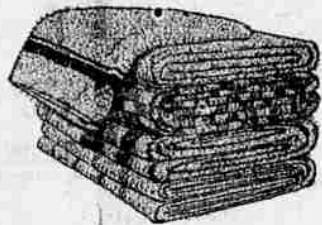

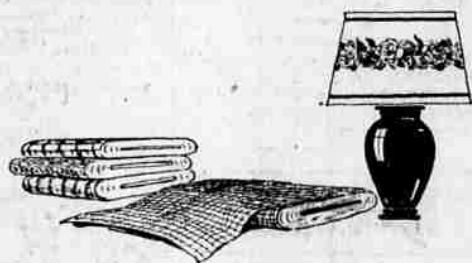
