

ANNUAL MEETING LOCAL RED CROSS LIBRARY THURSDAY

The annual meeting for the Jackson county chapter of the American Red Cross will be held at the library tomorrow, Thursday, at 2:30 p. m., to hear reports and elect a board of directors for the new year.

The great volume of work which is handled by the Red Cross office is a testimony of the need of this work and the efficiency with which the needy are being taken care of through this well established agency. GERMAN CHILDREN STARVING, MEDFORD REQUESTED TO AID

At a preliminary conference between H. L. Eddy, personal representative of Major General Henry T. Allen and Mayor Gaddis of this city which took place last night in the public library plans were laid for a campaign for funds for the American Committee of Relief for German children to take place in Medford during the coming week, in cooperation with the state committee headed by Robert H. Strong who is to launch soon a campaign to raise \$100,000 in this state, half in Portland and half in the outside districts. Whatever may have been done to bring about starvation conditions in Germany, it is certain that the little children there should not be blamed and that they must be fed and clothed, says Mr. Eddy.

Through the wide experience and the marvelous organization of the Quaker society who have been doing relief work in war-stricken Europe since the beginning of the war it is possible to feed one child one meal a day for 150 days this winter at 2 cents a meal or a total of \$3.

The committee appointed wish to raise sufficient funds to feed 500 of these children during the winter, 500 being Medford's quota in the state campaign.

Their further plans will be announced later and will include a two hour drive in the morning of next week that will cover the town, speakers in the theaters and at all club meetings and a house to house canvass by members of the committee.

TRUSTY ESCAPES AT JACKSONVILLE

After writing their names on the hotel register and just before signing the place of residence Mr. Rosenberg looked up inquiringly and said to Landlord Emil Mohr, "I'll leave it to you." "Well, then," replied Mr. Mohr, "considering the fact that you folks have been gone three months, you'd better make it Seattle. That is why the well known Medford and family are chronicled on the register as from the Washington state metropolis."

Almost all of this three months were spent by Mr. Rosenberg sick in bed. But he now looks and feels well, but does not look entirely natural as he has a mustache of the Charlie Chaplin variety. He reassuringly comments however, that he means no harm by wearing it.

"Anything for a change, you know," he says. Dave hopes his convalescence will continue to be fast until he is completely restored to his old time vigor. When he left here he was badly crippled with spinal trouble, due to an injury suffered a long time before, for which local physicians and Portland specialists could give no relief, so he went on to Seattle where a famous specialist looked him over and next think he awoke encased in a plaster cast with his spinal column rearranged—practically a new one. His condition has been improving greatly since that time.

"I am surely glad to be home," said David. "I like Seattle, but it is a big city with big city ways, where you can walk for blocks on the streets without meeting any one you know. Yet I have a wide acquaintance there. But how good it was to come back here and walk down town with friends shouting greetings from all directions."

completed after consolidation and consequent wider diversification of traffic.

"7. Co-operation between the shipper and the railways in order to secure a better distribution of traffic over the year and avoid congestion of peak periods of car shortages.

"8. Definite development of relief in terminals, securing co-ordination with motor truck feeders and distribution.

"9. Development of proper joint rates and service by water and rail transportation in order to relieve extension of railways where unnecessary and give the public the advantage of the cheaper water transit.

"10. A comprehensive national plan of inland waterway development in substitution of hit and miss activities, with priority in development to rivers and canals where substantial traffic may be expected, including development of the St. Lawrence waterway."
