

W. J. HARTZELL IS CANDIDATE FOR CO. JUDGESHIP

W. J. Hartzell, of Three Oaks, a large pear orchard west of Phoenix, announces today as a candidate subject to the May primary for the republican nomination for county judge.

Mr. Hartzell has owned, lived on and operated this orchard for fifteen years and is well known as one of the prominent orchardists and business men of the county.

He has been a member of the Talent Irrigation board ever since it was organized in 1915, has been president of the board for four years, which position he now holds and has been one of those principally interested in making such a success of that district.

Mr. Hartzell came here from Minneapolis, Minn., where he was engaged in the grain and live stock business for twenty-seven years. Prior to that he was a farmer in Wisconsin and Ohio and is thoroughly acquainted with the needs and difficulties of the farmers as well as the orchardist and business people generally.

PORTLAND MORE THAN CHARMED BY PAVLOVA DANCING

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—(Special)—Anna Pavlova, incomparable dancer, entertained and thoroughly intrigued an immense audience last night in Portland. The beauty of her own art and the work of her aggregation, all noteworthy artists, was satisfactory in all respects and was spectacular and fairlike by turns.

With Pavlova and her ballet Russe and symphony orchestra numbering more than 80 persons. She is accompanied by her husband, M. Dandré, and her manager.

Three features were presented by Pavlova and her co-artists with her premiere danseur, Novikoff Laurent. She gave "Bacchanale," a wild dance, vivid and intense. One of the loveliest numbers was the three-feature far-eastern and Japanese spectacle, material and music for which she gathered on her trip to foreign lands.

The gypsy ballet "Amarilla" was flashing and subtle, one of the best liked numbers of the remarkable program. Her "Death of a Swan," graceful and delicate, brought rounds of applause.

Pavlova will remain in Portland for two more performances before proceeding to Medford.

Pavlova will be at the armory Saturday evening, January 12. Medford is the only city in Oregon, except Portland where Pavlova and company will stop.

NEW REMEDY FOR WHEAT GROWER IS OFFERED, KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kas., Jan. 11.—A remedy for the leading wheat growing sections of the country was given by Dr. Alton Taylor, director of food research of Leland Stanford university, speaking today at the state agricultural convention as follows:

"Reduce the wheat acreage; emphasize hard wheat; secure more dairy cows and better cows; develop fodder crops for the balanced animal husbandry; raise more of the farm foods on the farm; diversify operations in accordance with the locality and practice summer fallowing where diversification is difficult."

Dr. Taylor, widely known as a food economist, expressed the opinion that co-operative marketing of wheat at this time would not raise the price. Co-operative endeavor to improve growers' practices more than co-operative selling should prove advantageous to wheat farmers, he said.

Wheat growing in the United States for the world market is being crowded out by cheap lands and low production costs in Canada, Argentina and Australia, he asserted. The effect on wheat growers in this country as far as markets are concerned, is the same, he said, as when the opening of cheap lands in the middle west made wheat raising unprofitable in the eastern states.

Dr. Taylor advised the wheat growers not to count too strongly on European demand for American wheat. Other countries producing a surplus of wheat can offer their product to European nations more cheaply than can American farmers, he declared.

H. SCHOOL MEETING OPENS IN EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 11.—High school students from all parts of the state are here today for the opening of the third annual conference of high school student body officers and editors and managers of high school publications. The meeting is held under the auspices of the school of journalism, the associated students and the officials of the University of Oregon.

Practical instruction in how to work on high school publications, as well as an insight into the university will be given the students.

The meeting will continue through Saturday. Governor Walter M. Pierce is on the program to address the students Saturday afternoon on law enforcement.

FORD OFFERS TO SELL POWER TO DETROIT

DETROIT Jan. 11.—Henry Ford in conference yesterday with Acting Mayor Joseph A. Martin, offered to provide the city of Detroit with power from the new Ford Motor company plant being constructed at River Rouge, it was learned today when Mr. Martin called a conference of the public light commission to consider the offer. The city has voted to spend \$12,000,000 to build a power plant. Mr. Ford expressed the opinion he could sell power to Detroit at less cost than the city could produce its own.

Sports HOPPE TAKES LEAD OVER COCHRAN IN SECOND CUE MATCH

BOSTON, Jan. 11.—Willie Hoppe, defending champion, ruled a favorite today over Welker Cochran, challenger, as a result of the 124 point lead which the title-holder gained in the opening block of their 1500 point challenge match for the world's 18.2 ball line billiards championship, which began last night. Hoppe won the first block 500 to 376, finishing with an uncompleted run of 43. The balls were left in good scoring position along the left rail for the resumption of play tonight in the second block.

Tonight's block will be concluded when the gross score of one of the players is 1000. Tomorrow night the concluding 500 points will be played off.

YOKEL DEFEATS IRA DERN IN OGDEN, UTAH

OGDEN, Utah, Jan. 11.—Mike Yokel of Jackson Hole, Wyo., veteran middleweight wrestler, defeated Ira Dern of Salt Lake City, claimant of the world's title, in a finish match here last night. Yokel won the first fall in forty minutes with a toe hold. Dern won the second in eight minutes and 34 seconds with a headlock and Yokel won the final in six minutes, 43 seconds, with a crotch hold.

MIAMI, Fla.—Young Stribling, Macon, Ga., schoolboy light-heavyweight knocked out Mike Nestor of New York, in the sixth round of a scheduled twelve round bout last night.

MINNEAPOLIS—Three stars of the American Olympic ski team were declared ineligible for Olympic competition last night a few hours before they were to leave for New York and France.

KANSAS CITY.—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion last night defeated Joe "Toots" Mondt, Colorado cowboy, in two straight falls.

PANAMA, Jan. 11.—Johnny Dundee's manager has accepted the terms offered by Promoter Roberts for a fight between Dundee and Jose Lombardo in Panama City on February 22, according to an announcement by Roberts.

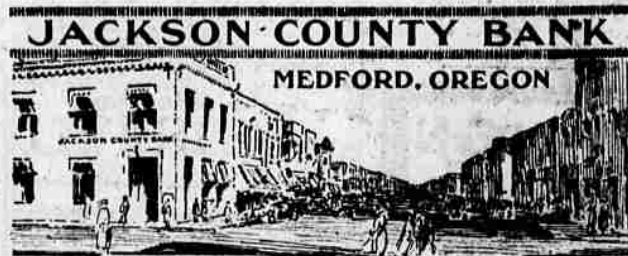
