GENERAL ALLEN ASKS MEDFORD PEOPLE TO AID GERMAN CHILDREN

Below is a copy of a message received by Mayor Gaddis yesterday from General H. T. Allen, world war veteran and former commander of American forces in the occupied zone.

New York, N. Y., Jan. 9, '24. Mayor E. C. Gaddis, Medford, Oregon.

Intimate knowledge gained from my four years service on the Rhine and my recent visit to Germany has prompted me to accept chairmanship American committee for relief German children in full confidence that leading Americans throughout the country will cooperate to effect successful appeal for adequate funds to meet the need. This is purely a humanitarian effort to prevent wholesale starvation of millions of German children this winter and has the fullest endorsement of Secretary Hoover and others concerned solely from the standpoint of relief to helpless multitudes of hungry and starving. Robert H. Strong, Portland, has accepted the Oregon chairmanship; will you at once select chairman for your county and cooperate with committee for Oregon to raise states share national fund of ten million dollars which is minimum requirement for American charity to save these helpless ones.
