FORCE VENIZELOS TO BE PREMIER

ATHENS, Jan. 11.—(By Associated Press). Ex-Premier Venizelos decided today to form a cabinet in which he will be premier, without portfolio, with Georges Roussos, republican liberal leader, as foreign minister, as the only possible solution of the protracted governmental crisis.

M. Venizelos reached this decision after General Danglis, who consented yesterday to endeavor to form a ministry, had failed in the attempt despite an all-night effort.

General Danglis' failure caused the keenest disappointment to Venizelos and his decision to become premier himself was taken as apparently the only course remaining open.

BANKER PLEADS HE DIDN'T READ REPORT

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 11.—State Senator Percy L. Sinclair, on trial in Lewis county superior court on a charge of rendering a false statement as to the conditions of the defunct Southwestern Washington bank at Ilwaco of which he was president, today took the stand to testify in his own behalf.

He admitted signing the alleged false statement June 30, 1923, but said "I did not read it over and did not know it was false. I did not know my own account was overdrawn as my boy, Myron, looked after my account, nor did I know that anything was wrong with the bank accounts."

SHIP 15,000 FEET OF SNOW FOR SKI JUMP

BRIARCLIFF MANOR, N. Y., Jan. 11.—In thirty motor trucks workmen today began hauling 15,000 feet of snow to Briarcliff Lodge from the Scarborough station of the New York Central railroad where it arrived yesterday in six gondola cars from Thendara, a little town in the Adirondacks.

Delivery of the snow at the lodge will complete one of the most spectacular efforts to supply New York City with thrills. It was shipped from Thendara to make a ski-jumping slide and landing platform for the American Olympic skiing team at its public exhibition Sunday before sailing to compete in the Olympiad in France. The proceeds will help finance the team's trip abroad.

NEW TRAIN SCHEDULE ON S. P. ANNOUNCED

The new passenger train schedule for the Southern Pacific goes into effect next Sunday, January 13, and affects the time and departure of four trains in the city. Train No. 16 will carry a diner between Sacramento and Portland.

Train 16, northbound, will depart from here at 7:42 p. m. instead of 6:05 p. m. as heretofore; train 54, northbound, will depart at 6 p. m., instead of 6:40 p. m.; train 53, southbound, will depart at 3:19 p. m., instead of 3 p. m.; and train 13, southbound, will depart at 10:25 a. m., instead of 10:30 p. m.

WIDOW SUED FOR STEALING AFFECTIONS CHAUFFEUR HUSBAND

BALISTON SPA, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Mrs. Ernest Ballou, who is suing Mrs. Leland Sterry, widow of a Palm Beach hotel proprietor for 50,000, charging alienation of her husband's affections, is expected to resume the witness stand today at the trial here. She testified yesterday as to changes in her husband's habits after he became Mrs. Sterry's chauffeur. She said he never drank nor smoked and always came home until May, 1922, when he began staying out late. She found his palamas in the Sterry garage, she said; scented Mrs. Sterry's perfume on his clothing and heard him, awake and asleep, talk of "his Sterry." When she wrote him letters asking him to support his family, she testified, Mrs. Sterry telephoned her saying: "Stop interfering with my chauffeur."

SENATOR WATSON NOT TO OPPOSE COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Senator James E. Watson of Indiana announced today that he would not be a candidate for the republican presidential nomination.

Senator Watson's announcement left the way clear for President Coolidge to enter the Indiana presidential primary with Ewing Emission of Vincennes as the Coolidge campaign manager in that state.

Senator Watson issued only this statement: "I have concluded not to be a candidate for the republican nomination for the presidency."
