GEO. MANSFIELD TO ACT AS JUDGE EUGENE DEBATE

George A. Mansfield, who only recently returned from a visit at Portland arrived in the city from his home near Prospect yesterday afternoon, and shortly afterwards received a telegram from Elam Amstutz at Eugene asking him if he would serve as judge at the British Columbia-University of Oregon debate on January 18.

The candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator from Oregon scratched his head thoughtfully for a moment while reading the telegram at the Hotel Medford and then remarked, "I guess its all right for a debate, but I'll not act as judge at a baby show or similar event, while I am a candidate. Its too risky." Then he wrote out his acceptance and wired it to Eugene.

Mr. Mansfield expresses himself as immensely pleased with the momentum his candidacy is gaining daily throughout the state as shown by the voluntary pledges of support he is receiving although he has not yet begun active campaigning and will probably not do so for at least several weeks. The treatment he received at the recent Jackson banquet in Portland at which he was one of the speakers, and afterwards, especially pleased him and put much encouragement in his senatorial candidacy. Prominent leaders and voters were assembled at that annual gathering of democrats from all parts of the state.

Mr. Mansfield will remain in the city until Thursday when he leaves by auto for Eugene to attend the debate at which he will act as judge.

SCORES KILLED IN JAP QUAKE

September, occurred at 5:45 o'clock. The shock approached those of September 1 in intensity, but was comparatively brief in duration.

The Imperial hotel filled with American travelers, many here as a result of reconstruction necessitated by the September catastrophe quickly emptied as the hostelry trembled and shook during the earth shocks. A near panic ensued as the guests rushed for safety outside the structure. No casualties were reported however.

Eat in Streets. Thousands of residents of Tokyo were eating breakfast in the streets of Tokyo this morning, not daring to return to their homes. Railway service west of Tokyo has been suspended as a result of the damage wrought

by the quake. Local street railway lines suspended service for a half hour after the shock, but service was resumed when a cursory examination revealed that the lines had not been permanently impaired by the tremor.

Except for windows smashed by the shock, plaster shaken from the walls and tiles from the roof, no serious damage was caused to the Imperial hotel. All the serious casualties in the affected district are said to have been confined to Japanese.

Trains Overturned.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 15.—(By the Associated Press)—Advice received from Osaka by the Nihon Dempo, Japanese news agency, stated that a tremendous earthquake in the Kanto district, in the vicinity of Tokyo and southwestward, shortly before six o'clock this morning had several communications between Tokyo and Osaka.

The traffic department of the Osaka railway bureau has reported that two express trains which left Kobe on the night preceding the quake were overturned in the neighborhood of Gotemba, in northeastern Suruga province near Odawara, where the tremor is said to have displayed great intensity.

wake of a heavy earthquake which occurred this morning, according to advices received from the affected district of the Nihon Dempo, a Japanese press association here.

The reports state that the emperor and empress are safe at Numadzu, despite widespread destruction in that city, in which many houses are said to have been shaken down. The Imperial villa, located at Numadzu, was not damaged, however, the reports state.

The area of greatest damage is said to have been between the towns of Gotemba, which is about eighty miles southwest of Tokyo, and Kozu, and southward in the vicinity of Hakone, according to reports received over a single railway line kept in operation by the Kobe railway bureau between Tokyo and Honsu.

Slight damage was suffered by the district between Tokyo and Kozu, advices from this source stated. The quake was felt at Nagoya, about 200 miles southwest of Tokyo, in the province of Owari and in Shizuoka, in Suruga province along Suruga bay.

Quake Lasted 14 Minutes. The meteorological observatory at Osaka announced after the quake that the width of the oscillations recorded in the seismograph by the earth shock was 39.5-10 millimeters. The quake lasted for fourteen minutes. The seismological center apparently was

off the Kishu coast, it was stated.

The Eastern News agency has received reports that the damage to Tokyo was not extensive, but that it was severe in the Kanto district and east of Hakone, in Suruga province where telephone, telegraph and train service was stopped as a result of damage wrought by the earth shocks.

Advices received by the Nihon Dempo at six o'clock this morning from Osaka stated that there was no sign of any outbreak of fire at Tokyo. A report from Takasaki, a city near Tokyo, however, stated that telephone service at the capital had been suspended, and the street railway lines put out of commission. The water system, although crippled, was being operated at that time, it was said.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Jefferson Caffery, American charge at Tokyo, cabled today that Tokyo and Yokohama "suffered a severe earthquake shock this morning," causing temporary suspension of railway service, the water supply, the electric lighting system and telegraphic and telephonic communication. He said Tokyo newspapers estimated that fifty persons were killed.

No Americans were reported among the dead. Frederic D. K. Leclercq, second secretary of the American embassy, suffered a fractured wrist, Mr. Caffery said, adding that with this

exception the staffs of the embassy and the consulate general had suffered no injury.

Quake Tremors Felt Here.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The latest Japanese earthquake, as recorded on the Georgetown university seismograph, continued for almost two hours and reached its maximum intensity between 6:45 a. m., and 6:50 a. m. Tokyo time.

Father Tondorf, in charge of the instrument, reported that the first tremors were picked up at 6:15 a. m., and that they continued until about 8 a. m.

OSAKA, Japan, Jan. 15.—(By Associated Press). The serious earthquake which began at 5:45 a. m. today around the Nagano prefecture is supposed to have been centered at Matsumoto. The damage is not known here.

Tokio and Nagoya were affected by strong tremors. Osaka and Koyoto felt the shocks slightly.

Nagano prefecture is situated on a table land in the central part of the main island of Japan. Silk is the most important industry of the region. There also is extensive farming and forestry. Matsumoto is a prosperous commercial city with heavy transactions in cocoons and silkworm eggs.

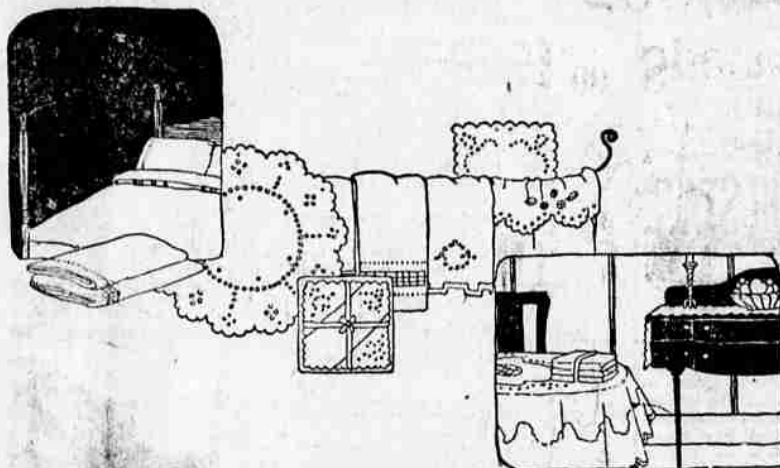

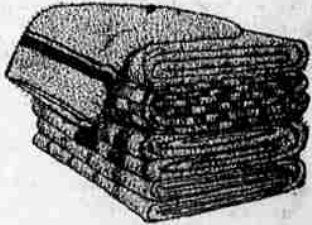
