

O. C. BOGGS HAS NO EVIDENCE OF DRY VIOLATIONS

In The Mail Tribune of Monday, January 14, in a report of the meeting of the grand jury, the following was printed: "Among the matters to be probed, when it does meet, is a number of alleged violations of the prohibition laws, the evidence to date being in the hands of O. C. Boggs."

This statement is denied by Mr. Boggs.

In explanation of The Mail Tribune's attitude, and to clear up the situation, a representative of The Mail Tribune, with Mr. Boggs went to Jacksonville this morning, and called District Attorney Borden from the grand jury room, when the issue was presented to him, and Mr. Borden said:

"I said this. If Mr. Boggs has any evidence, he has not turned it over to me." The district attorney said he did not know whether Mr. Boggs had, or had not the evidence.

Mr. Boggs then said: "That is different from the statement published in the paper."

Then Mr. Borden asked Mr. Boggs: "Have you any evidence?"

Mr. Boggs replied: "That is for you to find out."

Whereupon Mr. Boggs and the reporter started to go down the stairs in the courthouse.

"If you have got any evidence, we want it today, Boggs," Mr. Borden called after him.

"I am not going to do your work. If that is what you are looking for," rejoined Mr. Boggs.

The district attorney, from his conversations on the subject, evidently is under the impression that Mr. Boggs has evidence, and left the same impression with the reporter when questioned for information.

After the return to Medford, Mr. Boggs stated "that he had no evidence, but would give Mr. Borden no information."

MAURICE FRANCIS EGAN, EX-MINISTER DENMARK, PASSES

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—Arrangements will be completed today for the removal to Philadelphia of the body of Dr. Maurice Francis Egan, former United States minister to Denmark, who died yesterday. He was 71 years old.

Serving under three presidents as minister from the United States to Denmark, Dr. Maurice Francis Egan, at the time of his retirement had the distinction of being the dean of the American diplomatic service, and was widely known as an author, editor, teacher and lecturer. He was born at Philadelphia, Jan. 24, 1852.

Dr. Egan was educated at La Salle college and Georgetown University and for several years thereafter occupied himself as editor of various Roman Catholic publications.

In 1888, he became professor of English literature in the University of Notre Dame in Indiana. Seven years later he was appointed to a similar position at the Catholic University in Washington, D. C.

During this period, Dr. Egan was author of numerous novels and volumes of poems and works of non-fiction. He was well-known as a literature figure in the late 'nineties and in the early years of the twentieth century and held many academic degrees.

Dr. Egan went to Denmark as minister in 1907. After serving under three presidents, he was forced in 1918 to resign because of ill health, having become at that time dean of the American diplomatic service.

He was in Copenhagen in 1909 when Dr. Cook arrived from the polar regions with the story of the North Pole. Becoming a central figure in the Cook controversy because of his defense of the explorer, he receded from his position only when Cook's claims were proven false. Later Dr. Egan took a prominent part in the purchase by the United States of the Danish West Indies.

In 1919, Dr. Egan was elected to the American Academy, succeeding Theodore Roosevelt. He was decorated by the King of the Belgians in 1906 and the King of Denmark in January, 1923.

INCOME TAX MEN HERE FEB'Y 11TH

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 16.—Oregon income tax payers are to have the assistance of deputies from the office of Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenues, in making out federal income tax statements for the year 1923. Collector Huntley has arranged a tour, including all the principal cities of the state which will be visited by experienced deputies during the six weeks beginning January 29 and ending March 15, which is the final day for filing returns. The services of the deputies will be offered without cost to the taxpayers. The itinerary includes: Salem, February 21-March 5; Medford, February 11-16; Roseburg, February 26-March 8; Pendleton, February 29-March 15.

AUTO CAMPS ARE MAIN SUBJECT AT COUNCIL MEETING

In addition to discussing the city treasurer's annual report, the city council at a lengthy meeting last night approved the ordinance providing for the leasing of the city auto camp by the Merrick Motor Inn, passed a number of minor ordinances, had discussions relating to delinquent property assessments, and transacted much routine business.

Mayor Gaddis, City Recorder Alford, City Attorney Carlin and City Superintendent Davis were present, as well as Councilmen Alenderfer, Butler, Crose, Hubbard, Paul, Jacobs and Hammond. E. H. Janney, the missing councilman, was out of the city in Portland.

The mayor appointed Olen Arnsperger, member of the city water commission whose term for one year had expired, to a term of five years.

An outline of the new auto camp which Ira D. and E. D. Phipps will establish on property located at the northeast corner of Riverside and Jackson streets, was submitted to the council, which body after some discussion approved, providing the promoters of the venture comply with all city ordinances. The new camp as outlined will have a concrete refilling station 20x20 feet, also a community house 20x30 feet, or larger, and other accommodations including small houses and tent houses.

In order to have a filling station this location, which is now in a residence zone, will have to be transferred into the fire limits zone, in accordance with the city zone plan system and rules. The legal steps necessary will at once be undertaken.

The ordinance providing for the lease of the city auto camp by Walter D. Merrick and Seeley V. Hall safeguards the city and public in every way, and requires a yearly rental of \$600 cash, for a term of two years, or in lieu of paying a cash rental of \$600 annually the lessees if they so desire can spend \$1200 in permanent improvements on the leased ground on or before May 1st next.

If the plan of building permanent improvements in lieu of the cash sum, is adopted by the lessees, and it is understood that it will be, the improvements must be made in accordance with the plat prepared by the park committee of the city council, and such buildings shall be built of similar type and design to the buildings on the premises.

At the expiration of the two years' lease the lessees shall have first right to lease the premises for an additional period.

The lease also stipulates that the patrons of the grounds shall have the use of the Natatorium building and equipment to the same extent as the patrons of the Merrick Motor Inn, and the lessees agree to construct a connecting bridge between the two auto camps, which will be operated as one by the lessees, and maintain a fifty cent camp ground charge. However the lessees are permitted to construct other houses and equipment on the leased camp and provide such other equipment as deemed necessary, and especially a continuation of the present lattice work towards the east, for which they can make a 75 cent charge.
