LONDON, Jan. 17.—(By the Associated Press)—The country watched today the opening of the final scene in the life of the Baldwin government. The introduction in the house of labor's "no confidence" motion.

Notwithstanding the belief that the overthrow of the ministry is inevitable, the conservative whips are doing their utmost to keep the party at full strength throughout the debate on the amendment, especially for next Monday's crucial vote. The other parties also are urgently whipping their followers and there is every indication of a full attendance at the night session of the twenty-first, at which the vote on the no-confidence resolution will probably be taken.

The latest effort of the opponents of a laborite government is an appeal to Winston Spencer Churchill to take the lead against Ramsay MacDonald and his followers.

## GYPSUM RATES IN OREGON REDUCED BY COMMISSION

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—The public service commission announces the establishment of joint through rates, effective February 19, between Gypsum in eastern Oregon on the Oregon Short line and points on the lines of the Southern Pacific south of Portland, including Salem, Albany, Corvallis, Eugene and Roseburg, on carload shipments of wall plaster, carload plaster and gypsum rock. Hitherto these commodities were shipped to Portland on a 16 cent rate plus the local rates from Portland, south.

The new carload rate for instance on a 60,000 pound car of land plaster to Eugene is now 26 1/4 c, a reduction of 7 1/2 cents per hundred pounds or 4 1/2 per car.

The eastern Oregon plant has for its main competitor the plant at Gypsum, Montana, which, it is claimed, sought to invade this territory through the medium of special low rates. This tariff was suspended by the interstate commerce commission and a decision now handed down requires the Montana schedules to be cancelled on the grounds that the proposed rates and minimum weights were unduly prejudicial to the Oregon plant.
